A. PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES: June 6, 1976 to August 12, 1976

1. Organization and assignment of staff for Argentina account, establishment of procedures to handle account, negotiations for contractual and compensation arrangements.

2. Established news monitoring network for matters relating to Argentina.

3. Press relations activities in support of visits by Argentine Minister of Economy Alfredo Martinez de Hoz to the United States and other countries.

4. Preliminary audit of various U.S. publics regarding attitudes on Argentina, and preparation of report showing results.

5. Meetings with U.S. Department of Justice to review procedures for acting as public relations counsel for a foreign government.

B. PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES: August 13, 1976 to September 13, 1976

1. Visit to Argentina by:

- o James J. Cassidy, Vice Chairman/General Manager, Burson-Marsteller, Washington, D.C. (3 days)
- o William F. Noonan, Executive Vice President/General Manager, Burson-Marsteller, New York (12 days)
- o Wayne Kurlinski, Account Supervisor, Burson-Marsteller, New York (5 days)
- o Ken Huszar, Senior Account Executive, Burson-Marsteller, New York (15 days)

Purpose of these visits included finalization of agreement between Burson-Marsteller and the Government of Argentina, as well as recommendations by Burson-Marsteller to the Government of Argentina relating to short- and long-term public relations programs. Interviews were conducted with a number of key people in the public and private sectors.

2. Written materials prepared during visit:

- a. Revision of short-range public relations recommendations.
- b. Preparation of special recommendations on the communications aspects of dealing with political events.

c. A computer listing of various news media coverage for 1976.

d. Other documents pertaining to finalization of administrative and other duties associated with the account.

3. Other activities during visit:

a. Visit to Argentine ranch to gather information about agriculture products.

b. Government boat trip to Rio Plata delta. That trip included discussion of tourist opportunities and possible government plans to that regard.

c. Informal tour of Buenos Aires cultural facilities and other areas of potential tourist interest.

4. Established contacts with Argentine Embassy in Washington and Argentina Consul in New York. Continuing contact is maintained at both the Embassy in Washington and the Consulate in New York to discuss all facets of the account and to obtain approval for all written materials.

5. A Burson-Marsteller representative attended the American Society of Travel Agents Conference in New Orleans in behalf of the Government of Argentina in September and interviewed travel agents there for possible future Argentine promotion travel opportunities.

6. Burson-Marsteller (Washington) arranged television and press coverage of the arrival in the United States capital of an Argentine gaucho, who rode his horse all the way from Argentina to the United States to commemorate the U.S. Bicentennial.

7. Met with Smithsonian representatives to plan publicity for an exhibit of Argentine silver which is touring U.S. cities.

C. PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES: September 13, 1976 to October 23, 1976

1. Held various meetings with Embassy/Consulate personnel to plan for visit of Argentine Minister of Foreign Relations and Worship, Cesar Guzetti.

2. Held meetings in Washington and New York with Commander Perez Froio, information officer to Mr. Guzetti, to plan press coverage for the visit of the Foreign Minister.

3. Met with Embassy personnel in Washington to plan for rededication of a statue of General Jose de San Martin in connection with the visit of the Foreign Minister.

4. Arranged radio, television and newspaper coverage of statue rededication in Washington.

5. Met with Embassy personnel in Washington to discuss long-range public relations activities.

6. Counseled Embassy personnel on releasing news stories regarding speech by Argentine President Jorge R. Videla dealing with the closing of some anti-Semitic publications in Buenos Aires and Argentina's refugee assistance program. Also counseled the Embassy on which media should receive those stories.

7. Translated Spanish version of a speech by the Argentine Minister of Foreign Relations and Worship, Cesar Guzetti, which was to be delivered at ceremonies marking the rededication of a statue of General Jose de San Martin.

8. Prepared press kit to be distributed to the media in connection with ceremonies marking the rededication of a statue of General Jose de San Martin.

9. Designed, outlined and wrote prototype of our Argentine newsletter to be published and distributed by the government to various publics. The newsletter would contain news of Argentine cultural developments, economic progress, and other topics.

10. Planned press coverage for ceremonies marking the dedication by the Government of Argentina of a painting to the National Aeronautic and Space Administration.

11. Worked on ideas to prepare feature news material on the International Arbitration board's deliberations on the Beagle Canal near Tierra del Fuego.

12. Staff in continuing communication with Buenos Aires regarding various matters relating to the account.

13. New York staff monitoring activities of all Burson-Marsteller worldwide offices working on the account as well as generating directives, administration and other details on many projects in other countries. The New York staff provides Buenos Aires with a weekly pouch detailing activities each week.

14. New York staff involved in planning mid-November tour of Canadian journalists to Argentina for stories on Argentine travel and tourism, historic and cultural matters, economic policies, etc.

15. Washington office handled arrangements for meetings between Bernardo Nuestad, a prominent Argentine journalist, and key campaign officers of both Democratic and Republican presidential candidates.

16. Worked with national outdoor magazine editor regarding article on Argentina's hunting, fishing, and camping.

17. Wrote and edited a comprehensive audit of eight target nations, comprised of interviews with more than 400 individuals in the fields of finance, industry, the media and tourism.

18. Wrote several general information articles on Argentina for future distribution to selected media in this and other countries.

19. Washington and New York worked jointly on a news story regarding a loan made to the Government of Argentina by a consortium of New York banks.

20. Wrote a special news feature on the Argentina Grand Prix automobile race. Awaits placement.

21. New York staff held a meeting with the Argentine-American Chamber of Commerce.

22. Meetings with several individual representatives of a variety of professions in Argentina for background and news story material in the interest of the ongoing public relations program for Argentina.

23. Coordinated with the Tokyo office plans for the visit of the Argentine Minister of Finance, Dr. Martinez de Hoz.

24. Staff members visited Argentina to present long-range proposal and final eight-country audit.

ATTACHMENT III

ACTIVITIES FOR GOVERNMENT OF SPAIN CONCERNING THE VISIT OF THEIR MAJESTIES May to July, 1976 (No. 11, page 3)

A. GENERAL ARRANGEMENTS

1. Assisted with names of journalists and executives to be invited by the Embassy to the breakfasts in Washington and New York, and with invitations to women journalists for a meeting with Her Majesty in Washington.

2. Maintained contact with the Ambassador and with the Spanish Consul General in New York, to assist them in any appropriate way to help assure that communications problems would be minimized, and kept current on arrangements so that the press would be properly informed.

3. Assisted the Embassy in media briefings in Washington and New York by Spanish Government officials.

4. Assisted Spanish officials in arranging for photographs to be available in Washington and New York of Their Majesties and of the various works of art which they were to present.

5. Assisted in the selection of pictures of the Royal Family to be used in the special section of the New York Times.

B. PREPARATION OF MATERIALS

1. Assisted Spanish officials to the extent desired in preparation of advance releases as follows:

a. A fact sheet on the historic significance of the visit, emphasizing the contribution of Spain to the independence of the United States. This document was part of a press package including biographies and photographs of the Royal Family, and of the principal members of the Official Party.

b. A separate release describing the various gifts to be made during the visit, accompanied where appropriate by photographs.

c. A separate release including biography accompanied by photographs for women's pages and magazines.

2. Briefing papers were prepared as follows:

a. A memorandum describing the rules that prevail when high personages or officials talk with the media in the United States, differentiating between "on the record," "off the record" and "not for attribution."

b. An advance memorandum on the backgrounds of the journalists attending the breakfast in Washington.

c. A background memorandum on the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

d. A background memorandum on Walter Washington, the mayor of Washington, D.C.

e. A background memorandum on personages involved in New York City activities.

3. Briefing papers also were prepared as follows:

a. A background memorandum on Mrs. Gerald Ford and her interests.

b. A background paper on Columbia University.

c. A background memorandum on the women journalists scheduled to attend the breakfast in Washington.

4. Suggestions for Remarks

We were available to review, to the extent appropriate, the text of remarks to be made on various occasions during the visit and provide suggestions where these might be helpful. Such assistance was given relative to remarks on the occasion of:

a. The Galvez statue unveiling ceremony.

b. The media breakfast in Washington.

c. The Kennedy Center event, including unveiling of sculpture of Don Quixote.

d. The unveiling of the memorial plaque to the Martyrs, during Brooklyn visit.

C. ACTIVITIES DURING THE VISIT

We carried out the following activities during the visit:

1. Assisted the Ministry of Foreign Affairs information officials in dealing with print, radio and television media, in the preparation of news releases and other materials, and providing of special information required by various editors and correspondents to meet their specific needs.

2. Provided senior personnel to be available for any assistance needed by the Royal Party throughout the duration of the visit to the United States.

3. Maintained liaison with and assisted the United States and the Spanish press in the coverage of the visit.

D. POST-TRIP ACTIVITIES

We prepared a follow-up report for Their Majesties and the Foreign Minister on news coverage of the visit.

ATTACHMENT IV

ACTIVITIES FOR GOVERNMENT OF SPAIN
CONCERNING PARTICIPATION IN THE U.S. BICENTENNIAL
August to October, 1976
(No. 11, page 3)

The public relations program was intended to support, through publicity and other means, the Bicentennial events planned by Spain. It was intended at the same time to create further awareness of the contributions of Spain to the independence of the United States, and to generate greater understanding and appreciation of the historic and cultural ties which bind the two nations.

The public relations program included three principal components: counseling, preparation of materials, and publicity placement.

A. COUNSELING

This phase of the proposed activity was to review planned events, suggest methods to generate maximum interest in the events -- both as a totality and as separate entities -- and to establish mechanisms and responsibilities to accomplish the action agreed on.

B. MATERIALS

We undertook to prepare materials for Embassy release as follows:

1. General purpose press materials including:

- a. overall news release on Spain's Bicentennial activity including programs in key cities,
- b. feature stories on principal events,
- c. fact sheet detailing Spain's help in the U.S. Revolutionary War including soldiers, money, massive munitions assistance and other aid, and the participation of such historic figures as General Galvez,
- d. photographs and other graphics depicting Spain's assistance before, during and after the Revolution,
- e. photographs and descriptions of exhibits, statues, etc., involved in the various Bicentennial projects.

This material was for Embassy distribution to wire services, television and radio, selected metropolitan dailies, columnists and commentators.

2. Press materials for specific cities.

Included were advance press releases for Embassy or Consular distribution on the events planned in a specific city, information on participants, etc., together with photos and other appropriate

materials. Information was tailored to the interest of each locality, and local Spain-related history and other data were included insofar as possible.

C. ACTIVITIES

Working with Spain's Bicentennial officials and Consulates we:

1. Alerted media in cities involved about the Bicentennial event scheduled to take place.
2. Provided for Embassy or Consular release press materials appropriate to the event.
3. Provided additional suggestions, if desired, to enhance the effectiveness of a given event.
4. Helped arrange interviews with press, TV and radio.
5. Made available our press, TV and radio specialists in those cities where such help might have been needed.
