ACTIVITIES FOR GOVERNMENT OF ARGENTINA  
(No. 11, page 3)

Principal Activities: October 24 to November 15, 1978

1. New York office prepared and distributed three news releases.
2. The monthly economic newsletter was prepared and mailed.
3. Preparations were finalized for the food processing seminar scheduled for Dec. 4 in Chicago, with Argentine industry experts as featured speakers. B-M finalized the invitation list, and sent invitations with an enclosed reply card to executives in the food processing and packaging industry, consulting and legal firms, banks and also the food processing trade publications. Later, B-M followed up by contacting each invitee by phone to ascertain the probable seminar attendance.
4. The final version of the Investors Guide, approved by the client, was sent out to be printed.
5. The monthly economic newsletter mailing list was revised and updated, including additions and deletions, to better enable B-M to provide news to individuals, corporations and the media interested in Argentina.
6. B-M continued its orientation for the business community. A communications company requested assistance in contacting Argentine officials regarding foreign investment, a consulting firm asked for appropriate contacts at ENTel (Argentine Telecommunications company) for a business proposal, and a trade group

requested a list of U.S. architectural firms in Argentina. B-M supplied the appropriate names and contacts in each case.

7. A petroleum publication, with which B-M is often in contact about Argentine energy news, requested our help in setting up appropriate official and private interviews during an editor's trip to Argentina later in the year. Our office in Buenos Aires took care of support activities for the editor's visit.

Principal Activities: November 16 to December 15, 1978

1. New York office prepared and distributed ten news releases.
2. The monthly economic newsletter was prepared and mailed.
3. A first run of 200 copies of the Investors Guide, prepared and printed by B-M for the Economy Ministry and local embassy use, was received from the printers. The Under Secretary of Foreign Investments distributed the pamphlets at the Chicago seminar.
4. Last-minute details were finalized for the food processing seminar in Chicago Dec. 4. B-M sent a second mailing reminding invitees in the food processing and packaging industry, consulting and legal firms, banks and also the food processing trade publications, which was then followed up by telephone calls to confirm attendance. B-M was also in contact with the Chicago Association of Trade and Industry, which co-sponsored the seminar. As well, trade and local Chicago media were sent a news release announcing the seminar.

A group of Argentine industry experts addressed the seminar, headed by the Under Secretary of Foreign Investments, who showed a short film on Argentina. A total of 49 high-level executives and press attended the meeting. B-M had two representatives present to oversee details. All attendees received a press kit of information on Argentina, including material supplied by the Economy Ministry.

B-M arranged six interviews with the trade and local press for the Argentine delegation. Several private meetings were set up after the seminar for food processing and bank executives to talk at length with the Under Secretary and the other experts.

B-M prepared a written evaluation of the seminar, which was submitted to the Economy Minister.

5. Support activities were provided the Under Secretary of Foreign Investments and other Argentines who visited San Francisco after the seminar, at the invitation of the Pan American Society of San Francisco. B-M, working with the local consular office, contacted influential businessmen to invite them to a luncheon given by the Pan American Society for the Argentines.

B-M set up an interview for the Under Secretary with a leading West Coast daily. As well, B-M arranged private meetings for the Under Secretary with an engineering and construction company, an industrial design and packaging firm, and a brokerage house.

A written analysis of this event was prepared and sent to the Economy Minister.

6. At the request of the Banco de la Nación Argentina, B-M was asked to aid bank officials prepare local newspaper ad copy announcing the opening of the bank's Chicago branch.

Principal Activities: December 16, 1978 to January 15, 1979

1. New York office prepared and distributed seven news releases.
2. The monthly economic newsletter was prepared and mailed.
3. A questionnaire to gauge response to the Chicago food processing seminar in early December was prepared and mailed out to the 49 participants. The results were analyzed to provide informational data for any future seminars in the United States and to advise B-M offices in Europe now planning Argentine food processing seminars scheduled there throughout 1979.
4. As a result of Argentine Energy Secretary Daniel Brunella's U.S. visit in June 1978, B-M was asked to convey to him an invitation to participate in the Interpipe '79 Conference in Houston. The invitation was extended through our office in Buenos Aires.

Principal Activities: January 16 to February 15, 1979

1. New York office prepared and distributed twelve news releases.
2. The monthly economic newsletter was prepared and mailed.
3. Letters were prepared and mailed to major trade and business publications throughout the United States to request editorial schedules from each. We also offered to provide orientation or material in any of the trade publications areas if so desired. Some publications accepted our offer.
4. B-M prepared an article on Argentina for the Economy Minister, whose byline appeared when it was published by a major executives' magazine. At the publication's request, we also supplied photographs of Argentina.
5. At the request of the Council of the Americas, B-M provided several photographs of Argentina for use in the Council's annual report publication.
6. A B-M representative attended a meeting arranged by the Pan American Society, Argentine-American Chamber of Commerce, the New York City Board of Education, and Aerolíneas Argentinas to discuss possible publicity for a New York City high school essay contest about Gen. San Martín. The three winners would be given free trips to Argentina. After the initial meeting, B-M was not involved with the preparation nor apprised of the results.

7. The remaining copies of the Investors Guide were received from the printers. They are in storage, awaiting disposal by the Economy Ministry and the local embassy in Washington.
  
8. B-M redesigned the blue logo paper used for all Argentine press releases, to enable the use of a lighter weight paper. New release paper was printed, both for use in U.S. mailings and to be shipped to several of our European offices.

Principal Activities: February 16 to March 15, 1979

1. New York office prepared and distributed twelve news releases.
2. The monthly economic newsletter was prepared and mailed.
3. The results of the questionnaire, sent out to all of the Chicago food processing seminar, were tabulated and the general response summarized. A written analysis was prepared and sent to the Economy Minister. Basic points and general response were also communicated to our European offices, which later this year will organize similar seminars for the Economy Ministry.
4. The Argentine economic attaché in Chicago requested our help to prepare for an upcoming Chicago trade fair. B-M supplied background information and counseled on trade fair techniques.

Principal Activities: March 16 to April 23, 1979

1. New York office prepared and distributed twenty-two news releases.
2. The monthly economic newsletter was prepared and mailed.
3. B-M conducted a telephone survey of 12 of the food processing industry executives who attended the Chicago food processing seminar, to determine the interest level in the International Food Fair, which will take place in Buenos Aires in June. There was no interest in a proposal to visit Argentina at that time, and the idea was dropped.
4. A B-M representative attended the Argentine-American Chamber of Commerce annual luncheon, at which U.S. Ambassador to Argentina Raul Castro was guest speaker.
5. The editor of a petroleum publication contacted B-M to request help in arranging interviews for his planned trip to Argentina later this year. The request was conveyed to our Buenos Aires office, which is arranging contacts and interviews.
6. Account Supervisor Ken Huszar and Client Services Manager Vic Emmanuel visited Argentina to review activities during the first quarter of 1979 with the Economy Minister and the Under Secretary of Foreign Investments. Details for media support activities were worked out for the Minister's travel itinerary during the next quarter, the Under Secretary's travel schedule and a new trade office scheduled to open in New York City.
