October 24 - November 15, 1980

1. The New York office prepared and distributed 20 press releases.
2. The fifth issue of the Argentine oil newsletter was edited, produced and printed for the Argentine Energy Secretariat.
3. Production continued on the audio-visual presentation, which was finalized at the end of the period. It was shown at mining seminars scheduled for the week of November 17.
4. B-M wrote, edited, diagrammed and fully planned the first issue of the mining newsletter, also published in time for the scheduled mining seminars. We supervised the production and printing of the new newsletter, designed to fit into the general scheme as a complement to the other newsletters.

In addition, B-M prepared a mailing list of 1,800 mining company executives around the world. The list was delivered to the client, along with the published newsletters.

5. Final details were coordinated with Buenos Aires and Toronto for the six days of seminars with mining companies in New York, Toronto and Denver in mid-November.

B-M reconfirmed arrangements and meeting sites, and finalized the scheduling of sessions of U.S. and Canadian mining executives with the six-man Argentine mining delegation. To aid the Argentines with their presentations, B-M prepared a large mining map of Argentina, and several smaller charts.

In addition, three interviews were arranged for the Argentines with two major media and one trade publication. Information/press kits were also printed.

6. B-M was frequently in contact with the Argentine Trade Office to exchange basic information and to confer about details regarding the mining seminars.
7. Press queries continued during the month, and B-M complied with the requests for additional information. We also provided an update on a bylined hydroelectric story, plus biographical data about the person who wrote it.

November 16 - December 15, 1980

1. The New York office prepared and distributed three press releases.
2. A double issue of the monthly economic newsletter was edited, produced and printed for the Argentine Embassy in Washington.

3. The scheduled mining seminars took place Nov. 17-24 in New York, Toronto and Denver. B-M rehearsed the participants' presentations, and accompanied the Argentines to smooth over last-minute details.

The audio-visual presentation was given to the Argentines, who used it at the sessions with the mining company executives. In addition, they handed out the B-M prepared information kits and the mining newsletters.

B-M also accompanied the Argentines to previously arranged media interviews to discuss the progress of Argentina's mining industry.

A preliminary report on the seminars was prepared, and recommendations on follow-up activities were submitted to the client.

4. The worldwide mailing list for the mining newsletter was copied and submitted to the client.
5. Liaison continued with the Argentine Trade Office. In addition to the normal exchange of information, B-M was asked to set up two specific media interviews for Buenos Aires Province Undersecretary of Industry and Tourism Jorge Pereyra de Olazabal. B-M complied, although we did not accompany Mr. Pereyra to the sessions.
6. At the request of the client, B-M worked with a publication that was preparing a supplement on Argentina for February deadline. We supplied background information, identified photographs and supplied slides.
7. B-M began to rework the audio-visual presentation, replacing slides with others selected by the client.

December 16, 1980 - January 15, 1981

1. The New York office prepared and distributed 14 press releases.
2. B-M continued to provide orientation and guidance to the publication scheduling a supplement on Argentina for a February issue. We also supplied additional photographic material.
3. At the request of a teacher at a New York fashion and merchandise institute, a member of the Argentina account team lectured a senior class about Argentina and its export possibilities.
4. B-M continued its service to the business community, particularly in relationship to mining companies that called to request additional data about Argentina. B-M also supplied information for research institutes that requested more data.

5. Frequent liaison continued with the Argentine Trade Office, to exchange information and to discuss the latest developments in relation to the proposed government change. We also exchanged data with the Trade Office about companies that called to request information.
6. B-M wrote the copy for a 20-page metalworking brochure and prepared a layout; both were submitted to the client for approval.
7. A number of journalists contacted B-M to request information. Several asked for details on ports, while others wanted data about foreign investments and mining.

January 16 - February 15, 1981

1. The New York office prepared and distributed 21 press releases.
2. A double issue of the monthly economic newsletter was edited, produced and printed for the Argentine Embassy in Washington.
3. The sixth issue of the oil newsletter was edited, produced and printed for the Argentine Energy Secretariat.
4. The New York office coordinated plans and activities between the client in Buenos Aires and our Geneva office, prior to the client's participation in a seminar in Davos, Switzerland.

We arranged for the audio-visual to be shown, and also prepared and printed information/press kits, which were shipped to our Geneva office.

5. The New York office contacted a number of U.S.-based wine writers to invite them to visit Argentine vineyards at harvest time, on behalf of the Argentine government.

We coordinated with our Buenos Aires office, which organized the trip. Our New York office briefed the journalists at a luncheon, hosted by the Argentine Trade Office.

6. B-M answered press queries for data on oil discoveries, construction and petrochemicals.

In addition, one publication requested a major policy statement from the client to balance a lengthy article. B-M worked jointly with the Argentine Trade Office to obtain and transcribe the statement, forwarding it to the inquiring journalist.

7. The Argentine Trade Office and B-M worked together frequently, to exchange information and requests from companies and journalists and to coordinate details for the wine writers' trip to Argentina.

February 16 - March 15, 1981

1. The New York office prepared and distributed 11 press releases.
2. The monthly economic newsletter was edited, produced and printed for the Argentine Embassy in Washington.
3. Production began on the approved metalworking brochure. Graphs were finalized and photographs selected as the text was processed.
4. B-M wrote a 24-page food processing brochure, which together with a layout was submitted to the client for approval.
5. Liaison continued with the Argentine Trade Office. At its request, B-M arranged for several lunches with journalists from major publications.
6. B-M continued to answer press queries on Argentina, which focused on oil discoveries and developments, and petrochemicals.

March 16 - April 23, 1981

1. The New York office prepared and distributed 18 press releases.
2. B-M supervised the production of both the metalworking and food processing brochures, printed them and delivered both to the client.
3. Two members of the Argentina account team visited Buenos Aires to review B-M's work on behalf of the Argentine government, and to discuss future possibilities.
4. B-M account team members attended a reception in New York for General Roberto Viola, president-designate of Argentina.
5. B-M continued its liaison with the Argentine Trade Office in preparation of Gen. Viola's trip to the U.S., in addition to other normal consultations.

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1. Monitored press and publications concerning international electric cartel. Supplied ASEA with Report to House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, Subcommittee on Oversight & Investment in connection with the electric cartel.
2. Continued to monitor press on nuclear waste disposal.
3. Continued to monitor press and publications concerning industry's use of robots. Suggested that ASEA commence publicity to bring their model to attention of industry users.
4. Suggested and organized tour for press members to visit ASEA offices in Sweden for publicity effort. Tour was postponed. One columnist, however, made an independent trip to Sweden, visiting ASEA, and wrote a technical article based on the visit.
5. Discussed and suggested possibilities with ASEA on how to organize their centennial celebration.
6. Monitored press on AMTRAK's use of electric locomotive for possible ASEA interest.
7. Communicated with ASEA re executive making tour to meet with overseas public relations advisers, particularly in South America.
8. Corresponded with ASEA Corporate (Sweden) and ASEA Marketing (USA) on various matters of interest to ASEA.
