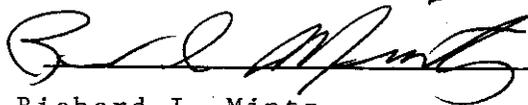

## **CalPERS Decision to Place the Philippines on Investment List Called Major Affirmation of Philippine Economic Program**

Sacramento, CA (Monday May 13, 2001) – The decision by the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) to return the Philippines to its permissible country list today has been well received by the Philippine Government.

Secretary of Finance Jose Isidro Camacho said, "We applaud the restoration of the Philippines as a preferred investment site for CalPERS. This decision is not just a business decision by a large international pension fund, but an affirmation by a leading international investor that the Philippines Economic Plan is on track and we are making progress in our effort to rebuild our nation's economy. It is also recognition that we have established political and economic stability and we have been successful in reining in inflation and managing our fiscal deficit. Coming on the heels of the multi-million dollar investment by the U.S. firm, UPS, this is further endorsement of the Philippines as a location for both capital and direct investment."

Albert del Rosario, Philippine Ambassador to the United States, addressed the CalPERS board in Sacramento, California, prior to its vote to restore the Philippines' investment status. In his remarks to the CalPERS board, del Rosario cited a number of key economic indicators that illustrated the strength of the Philippine economy: political stability, inflation at a 21-month low, employment up by 6%, a strengthening peso and positive outlooks from a number of credit rating agencies including Fitch's, Moody's and S&P.

Responding to the positive outcome following his presentation, Ambassador del Rosario said, "CalPERS is a bellwether for investors the world over and has enormous impact on the marketplace. I appreciate the rapid response of CalPERS in reversing their earlier position after being apprised of current developments. CalPERS' action today strengthens the belief that the Philippines is regaining the confidence of investors around the globe."

Secretary Camacho also noted that CalPERS' transparency with its screening and decision-making process allowed the Government of the Philippines to provide new information that had a bearing on the country's ranking. Two broad categories under CalPERS framework are used to evaluate the capability of emerging equity markets to support institutional investment -- country factors such as political stability, transparency and labor practices and market factors which includes market liquidity, volatility, capitalization, openness, settlement proficiency and transaction costs.

Secretary Camacho said, "In line with our practice of communicating proactively with the international financial and investment community, we met with CalPERS to share the progress that we have made over the past year in investor protection and market regulation -- developments that we believe were overlooked in their earlier analysis. Clearly, they agreed with our new data."

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Good governance and open market factors that were cited by Secretary Camacho in his meeting with CalPERS included, among others:

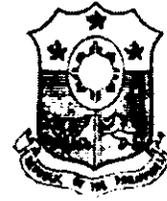
- Requirement for independent Directors on the Board of the Philippine Stock Exchange (Phisix);
- Existence of scriptless trading since 1996 with the establishment of the Philippine Central Depository to which the large custodian banks in the country are integrated;
- Reduction of settlement period to T+3;
- Liberalization of almost every sector of the economy with market refinements underway via new legislation, including the promotion of the mutual fund industry and the creation of special purpose asset vehicles to reduce the banking system's non-performing loan levels through private sector funding;
- Strong level of foreign participation as laws have evolved to open previously restricted sectors including telecommunications, banking, insurance, and retail sectors, among others.

Secretary Camacho added, "The Administration of President Arroyo will continue to work closely with the private sector to broaden its participation in the growth of the Philippine economy. This Administration is committed to the market reforms, fiscal discipline and promotion of good governance that will further enhance the business-friendly environment of the Philippines. In doing so, we will benefit from the foreign fund inflows, job creation and expansion of the middle-income sector that will develop our economy and ultimately, support our vision of eradicating poverty."

**STATEMENT BY H.E. ALBERT DEL ROSARIO  
PHILIPPINE AMBASSADOR TO THE UNITED STATES  
ON THE DEATH OF MARTIN BURNHAM AND EDIBORAH YAP  
AND THE RESCUE OF GRACIA BURNHAM**

The President of the Republic of the Philippines, H.E. Gloria Macapagal Arroyo, has expressed her sorrow over the deaths of Martin Burnham and Ediborah Yap. Their deaths occurred last night in a Philippine military operation to rescue hostages being held by the terrorist Abu Sayyaf Group. Philippine troops suffered casualties as well.

The Philippine Government and People are profoundly grieved by this loss of precious human life and condole with the families of Martin and Ediborah and of the Philippine soldiers who have fallen in the long months of the campaign against the Abu Sayyaf. They have our prayers.

While we grieve for those lost, we are thankful that Gracia Burnham was rescued. Gracia sustained a non-life-threatening wound to the leg and is receiving medical attention.

These tragic deaths strengthen the resolve of the Philippines to eradicate the scourge of terrorism from its soil. Towards this end, the Philippines remains a steadfast ally of the United States in the international counter-terror coalition. The solidarity of the people of the world will ensure our ultimate victory over terrorism.

**Philippine President Arroyo Makes  
Trade and Investment Trip to Silicon Valley**  
*Meets with Intel Chair Grove, Other Investors; Addresses the  
Commonwealth Club on Security and the Economy*

Santa Clara, California (October 28, 2002) – Philippine President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo today arrived in Northern California on a trade and investment mission designed to boost the combined trade between California and the Philippines that already exceeds \$12 billion per year.

Arroyo arrived in California from a meeting of the APEC leaders meeting in Los Cabos, Mexico where Arroyo joined other APEC leaders in discussing ways to unite against terrorism and attack the underlying causes of terrorism through increased economic cooperation.

“I believe that an equitable and open trading environment is crucial if we are to generate the jobs and economic opportunity that will help us overcome the poverty that cripples so many of our people,” said President Arroyo. “President Bush and my ASEAN colleagues asked me to take the lead on this new trade initiative for ASEAN. On behalf of the people of the Philippines, I have accepted.”

ASEAN stands for the Association of Southeast Asian Nations.

“Our APEC discussions focused on our physical and economic security. I have been a leader on the war against terrorism and believe the best antidote to terrorism and poverty is political freedom and economic opportunity,” continued Arroyo, herself a trained economist. “It is no coincidence therefore that I am following my APEC meeting with a business trip to Silicon Valley.”

“My mission is to stimulate trade and investment abroad in order to boost job creation and economic opportunity at home,” continued Arroyo. “California is our number one trading partner in the US and Silicon Valley helps fuel good-paying jobs in the Philippines. I am meeting with Andy Grove at Intel and many other key investors in an effort to encourage greater investment in the Philippines. Intel has already invested one

billion dollars and employs over 6,200 Filipino workers. That is my idea of a good anti-terrorism plan.”

Arroyo used her speech at the Commonwealth Club of California to outline her views on US-Philippine relations, the role of Asia in the fight against terrorism and the importance of economic reform in the Philippines to attract more jobs and investment.

Not only is the US the largest trading partner of the Philippines, but also the U.S. continues to be a major source of both direct and portfolio investments in the Philippines. U.S. direct investments registered \$193 million in 2001 and portfolio investments in excess of \$635 million.

The combined trade between California and the Philippines exceeds \$12 billion a year with the Philippines supplying the California high technology industry with silicon chips, semi-conductor devices, circuit boards and other electric and high tech components.

Intel has invested over \$1 billion in the Philippines and employs a labor force of 6,200 that in primarily ATM (assembly, test and manufacturing) facilities that produce high-speed computer processors such as the Pentium III, Pentium IV and Celeron processors, as well as chipsets and flash memory used in mobile phone handsets. Intel's Philippine unit was the major source for Pentium products in 2001.

Other major Silicon Valley investors in the Philippines include PeopleSoft, Cisco, HP-Compaq, Oracle, Sun Microsystems, Sybase and Agilent Technologies.

Calpers, the pension investment system for the State of California, also invests in the Philippines along with dozens of other companies, including Caltex, a subsidiary of ChevronTexaco. Caltex enjoys 20% of the local market share making it the third largest oil firm in the country. It operates a \$745 million refinery that processes 72,000 barrels per crude each day and has a retail network that is made up of 901 service stations and 52 Starmart convenience stores.

In her speech to the Commonwealth Club before an audience of business and civic leaders, Arroyo noted the rich resources of the Philippines. “The country is not short of talent. While there is a generous pool of competent scientists, engineers, I.T. workers, communication technologists, and senior managers, the government realizes that to move forward, to move higher into the value chain, we need to invest in education and training, to challenge the private sector to make that similar commitment, to entice our investors to work with us in the development of human capital.”

Arroyo also singled out her efforts at reform by saying, “To build this new outward-looking economy, we need to reform an inward looking bureaucracy and mindset laden with inefficiency and corruption. I have rolled up my sleeves and spend every waking hour occupied with building a domestic environment to attract investments, strengthen trade, create and expand markets and generate economic activity.”
