The Future of Lebanon at the Defense of Democracy Forum. 6/15.12

My mentor and An Nahar publisher who died last week Mr. Ghassan Tueini called the civil war in Lebanon “the war of others”, in his book with the same title. I am afraid that if Lebanon slides into a civil war this time it will be of their own making and fought by their own hands.

I believe, and I hope that this is not only an act of faith, that Lebanon is not and will not plunge into a new civil war as a result of the internal tensions between the Shiites and the Sunnis and because of the divisions in the country over the Syrian crisis. No party in Lebanon has an interest in a civil war now but there are so many similarities between today and 1975 that is giving the majority of Lebanese who still remember it heartache. I would argue that this situation is also similar to 1958 as much as 1975 with a reversal of roles of the main players.

I will mention some of the pressures and the solutions that are being put forward by both sides and speculate on where this is all going and you can judge if it is 1975, 1958 or a mere 2012.

Regional Context:

1-Once again Lebanon is caught in the midst of a regional confrontation. The Syrian-Iranian axis has its internal Lebanese partner in Hizbullah that is holding the levers of power in Lebanon and facing off with the democracy pro western movement, which unlike 1958 is not in power but in the opposition. This axis supported by Russia (in 1958 it was the Soviet Union), and Iraq can be counted in it.

Internal context:

2-Two major Lebanese sects, the Shiites and the Sunnis both feel they are targeted. The Shiites, especially Hizbullah believes that it has been

targeted since the withdrawal of the Israeli army from Lebanon. They point to the 2006 war, to the STL, to the calls to disarm as a proof that there is a Western –Arab-Lebanese plan targeting the party and the community. In yesterday's Al Joumhouriah newspaper a Hizbullah member of parliament was quoted as telling his loyalists "we are targeted as a Shiite community more than any time before. There is a Western Arab agreement to weaken us and to break us if their plan, to drive us out of the country and the South, does not work. They went to push us away from confronting Israel".

3-The Sunni community on the other hand is angry and feels it is targeted in its political role, its leadership and its image and that manifested itself lately in the violent outbursts in the streets of Lebanon. They recite a long list of grievances that they date back to the Syrian intervention in the 1970s. They speak of the alliance of the minorities between the regime in Syria and Hizbullah. The Sunnis do not think of themselves as a minority, they see themselves as part and extension of the majority Sunni Arab world.

- 4-The killing of late Prime Minister Rafik Hariri further increased their fears and the indictment of four Hizbullah operatives sent the tension between the two communities to new heights. But the turning point was the May 7, 2008 military campaign by Hizbullah against Beirut and AL Moustqbal movement because Hizbullah has used its weapons against its fellow Lebanese. The “resistance” weapons became an internal threat now. Some Sunnis dubbed this as a military coup by Hizbullah.
- 5-Toppling the Saad Hariri government, while he was visiting Washington, and in the oval office, was seen by the March 14th and the Sunnis as the political coup. The appointment of Najib Mikati as a prime Minister was opposed as an act by Hizbullah to appoint the Sunni prime minister.
- 6-The events in Tripoli added to the sense of insecurity among the Sunnis who accuse the government and the state of doing the bidding of Hizubllah and the Syrians.
- 7-The call of Nassrullah for a new “constituent assembly” to discuss options including the Taef, the power sharing formula which ended the war, was

seen by the March 14th coalition and the Sunnis as a call for a new constitution and shuffling the Lebanese cards. Red alarms went off in the Lebanese political scene.

8-There is also the new sense of empowerment that the Sunnis of Lebanon feel as a result of the Arab Spring. They see their actions as a reaction to the Hizbullah behavior over the last 20 years. Extremism brings extremism and violence encourages violence. Sheikh Salah Bakri, a Sunni Islamist in Tripoli was quoted two days ago as saying “there is now a Northern Dahiya (district) in the face of the Southern Dahiya (the headquarters of Hizbullah) as a result of the reluctance of the government to protect its citizens and because the government has been transformed into a P.O.Box for the Syrian regime”.

This brings us to the regional factor, the Syrian crisis.

The Lebanese are divided over the crisis in Syria. The March 14th, Sunnis included, see the government’s policy of dissociation as hypocritical. They too want to distance Lebanon from regional problems but they accuse the government of double standards when it

punishes their side if they help the Syrian people while turning a blind eye to Hizbullah and its allies helping the Syrian regime.

March 14th and the majority of the Sunnis believe that the Syrian regime is trying to export its crisis to Lebanon to use Lebanon as a card again after losing the Hamas card. The daily shooting inside the Lebanese border by the Syrian army and its Shabiha and the kidnapping of Lebanese who support the Syrian opposition is creating a very tense Lebanese – Syrian border and fueling anxieties at what the Syrian regime will do next. There are rumors that it might cross over to punish the Syrians who sought refuge to Lebanon. The resurfacing of the PFLF-GC leader in Lebanon, with President Assad in Damascus two days ago and in Terhran with President Najad is a source of concern in Lebanon on what might be in his pocket for Lebanon. The spate of kidnappings between ALawis and Sunnis in Akkar early this week and the burning of each sides' businesses and homes brought back the ghosts of 1975.

The letter of the Syrian ambassador to the UN claiming that “parts of the Lebanese territory adjacent to the Syrian border has become a hub for terrorist elements of AL Qaeda and the Muslim Brotherhood to destabilize Syrian security”, and Hizbullah’s accusations that their Lebanese opponents are smuggling arms to Syria is inflaming Sunnis and Lebanese in the North. (we can discuss the border in the Q and A in detail if you like).

The killing of a Sunni Sheikh Abd ALwahid, on a Lebanese army check point in Akkar, known for his support for the Syrian opposition brought things to the brink few weeks ago.

DIALOGUE:

Calls for dialogue came from both sides and it was very obvious that neither side wants things to go off the cliff. March 14th presented its plan for saving Lebanon calling for a solution to the Hizubllah “weapons” problem, called for demarcation of the borders

between Lebanon and Syria and distancing Lebanon from the regional and international axes. The plan called for a new neutral government that gains the confidence of the Lebanese people and prepares for the upcoming elections.

The president called for a dialogue session in Baabda Palace afraid of the "fire next to my home", referring to Syria. The session was held in the absence of the three major players: Nassrullah, Hariri and GeaGea. The last two were represented but GeaGea refused to participate in a futile exercise, as he called it. Everybody knew that nothing will come out of the session as long as the situation in Syria was still unresolved.

As expected the Hizbullah weapons were not on the table, but their shadow was looming over the room. The Hizbullah representative in the dialogue reportedly threatened his dialogue partners that the civil war in Lebanon will be a picnic this time compared to 1975.

The surprise was a prepared statement they called it the "Babda Declaration", which affirmed commitment

to the Taef Accords, and implementing all its articles (Hizbullah MPs were calling or implementing the article related to Syria mainly that Lebanon should never be used as a launching grounds to harm Syria), and keeping the door open for looking “into every desire to develop it or amend it”. The Declaration called also for distancing Lebanon from the axes policies and regional and international conflicts; as well as controlling the Lebanese-Syrian border and not allow the establishment of a buffer zone in Lebanon or using Lebanon as a base or path for smuggling men and arms to Syria”. President Suleiman was very frank in an interview with Al Akhbar this week when he said the most important thing in the Baabda Declaration was that Lebanon is saying to the world “do not ask me for a Safe Haven”. I agree with him this was the most important thing in the statement and may be that was the main reason for holding the dialogue especially it was interesting that the government sent copies of the Declaration to the UN and the Arab League.

I asked a seasoned politician in Lebanon what did he think of the dialogue and what it had accomplished.

His answer was one short: Aspirin” i.e Temporary relief and nothing more.

People that I value their opinion believe that Lebanon will not enter another civil war but it will not rest either. It will stay in the hospital with fever that will rise regularly depending on the state of the Syrian patient. Or if the regional equation changes as it did in 1958 when the Baghdad Pact collapsed. The pact that its fate is in the balance this time is the Iran-Syria – Hizbullah pact, because it is linked to the survival of the Assad regime and to how the Iranian nuclear issue will be dealt with in the next few month. The Lebanese and the Syrians this time are fastening their seat belts.
