

11. ACTIVITIES

NEW YORK OFFICE

As mentioned in Item 2 of the report, General Jean Victor Allard who had been appointed Agent General of the Province of Quebec to the United States, in September 1969, resigned his post on June 1, 1970, to return to Canada. Until a new appointment is made, the Director of Administration, Mr. Jean Marc Roy, is Acting Agent General.

Furthermore many changes have occurred in the key personnel of the New York office during the period covered by the report. The Director of Information, who resigned, and two economic counsellors - one having reached retirement, the other one having terminated his 3-year posting in New York - have returned to Canada. While the positions of economic counsellors have been filled, the post of Director of Information is still vacant.

The activities of the New York office - more specifically those of the Tourist Bureau - have increased in the last six months. This office has welcomed 6,955 visitors, answered 10,197 telephone calls from prospective tourists, investors or other persons seeking general information on Quebec, namely on immigration, working conditions, cost of living, education, cultural affairs, etc. etc. Also this office mailed some 9,000 first-class letters and kits containing promotional tourist literature. In addition, between January 1 and June 30, 1970, it has distributed - through United World Films, Inc. - a total of 1,255 films about Quebec to news media, schools and associations.

During the reporting period, the Tourist Attaché has maintained close contacts with the various travel agencies and associations. Amongst others, he has attended the luncheons and meetings of the Society of American Travel Writers (STAW), and the Assembly of National Tourist Office Representatives (ANTOR). In January, he travelled to Boston to attend the New England Vacation, Sports & Camping Show, and, in May, he went to the Travel Agents' Meeting in Washington. On May 14, as official representative of his Department of Tourism, Fish and Game, he was host to 60 Travel Writers at a reception held in New York to promote the resumption of the Saguenay - St. Lawrence cruises. He hosted a similar reception in Chicago, on May 26, for some 75 people. He was invited to address the Molloy Catholic College in Rockville Center, N.Y. and, on that occasion, he made a film presentation on Quebec. Several other groups and associations of Metropolitan New York have asked to have film presentations on Quebec.

Despite the many changes among its officers, the economic division of the New York office has maintained its usual activities:

1. INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

a) Plant Location Projects

Thirty-one U.S. firms have studied the possibilities of establishing manufacturing operations in Quebec;

11. ACTIVITIES (Cont'd)

- b) Manufacturing under License
Seven U.S. firms have asked the help of this office to find Quebec licensees for the manufacturing of their products in Canada;
- c) Industrial calls and consultations
The Economic Counsellors have answered 300 telephone inquiries regarding industrial development, and have received 106 visitors interested in finding out more about the advantages Quebec offers as a center of production and distribution.

2. TRADE PROMOTION

With the appointment of a Marketing Consultant, greater emphasis was put on trade promotion during the past six months:

- a) Export Projects
Retail outlets were sought for a number of both industrial and consumer products, mostly on an individual basis. More specifically, this office has helped eleven Quebec manufacturers wishing to sell their products in the United States.
- b) Fairs
During this period, the New York office has participated in four trade shows that involved the menswear industry, the snow-ski industry, the leather industry, and the furniture industry. A total of 36 manufacturers from Quebec who exhibited their lines sold and promoted their merchandise to the American retail trade. This activity involved direct mail, merchandising, advertising, publicity and press parties for editorial and retailer audiences. In addition to the activity outlined, marketing plans and programs for both the consumer and industrial products for Quebec are being prepared for the fiscal year 1971-72.
- c) Inquiries
The Economic Counsellor have replied to twelve inquiries from U.S. firms seeking industrial products manufactured in Quebec.
- d) Commercial projects
Several U.S. companies or individuals were given assistance in their plans to set up commercial ventures in Quebec.

BOSTON OFFICE

The organization of the Boston Office was completed in late April. The Counsellor in charge reported that during the period of January 1 to June 30:

- Five U. S. Firms have shown interest in establishing manufacturing operations in Quebec;

11. ACTIVITIES (Cont'd)

- He received 3 inquiries concerning the possibilities of investment in trades and public services, and some 29 inquiries from commercial prospects.
- In addition, he answered more than 700 general information inquiries (telephone calls, letters, office visits) on all kinds of subjects.

During that period, he participated in some 40 reunions, committees, meetings and conventions; he delivered lectures to four associations, visited and/or participated in twelve industrial and commercial shows. He prepared studies and written statements on subjects such as "The Buying Technics in New England," "The Franco-Americans in New England," "Shows and Trade Commissions," etc.

Our Counsellor also reported that during the past six months he maintained close contacts with business and industrial groups, as well as with social groups, by attending nearly 100 functions and receptions as host or as guest. Finally, he reported that he is a member of the University Club of Boston, the Rotary Club of Boston, and the Grasshopper Committee.

DALLAS OFFICE

The Counsellor in charge of the Quebec Office in Dallas, Texas, assumed his duties on December 1, 1969.

During the six-month reporting period, he established contacts with the Canadian banks in Dallas, a number of major American banks in Dallas and Houston, as well as with the representatives of the Canadian banks in Texas. He made a trip to Austin in order to meet with the Governor of the State of Texas.

While on an extensive trip in South Texas, he visited the Chambers of Commerce of several cities, namely, San Antonio, Corpus Christi and Galveston. He participated in the Seminar "Texas Gateway to World's Trade," held in Austin, and at the invitation of the Governor of Arkansas he attended the Seminar "Doing Business with Canada," sponsored by the Arkansas Industrial Development Council in Little Rock. On that occasion he met with representatives of the largest banks in Arkansas and industrialists who showed a keen interest in the Province of Quebec.

In the last six months, the Dallas Counsellor has been in contact with seven American firms which are considering the possibility of establishing manufacturing operations in Canada, particularly in the Province of Quebec, and three firms looking for Quebec licensees to manufacture their products. On the other hand, five Quebec manufacturers have asked the assistance of the Dallas Office to help them find outlets for their products in the Southwest of the United States.

The Counsellor visited different industrial exhibitions, the major ones being the National Association of Home Builders and the Supermarket Institute Convention held in Houston.

Though no publicity or advertising was made in his area, the Counsellor in Dallas reported receiving fifteen inquiries from prospective tourists or persons requesting general information on the Province of Quebec.

11. ACTIVITIES (Cont'd)LOS ANGELES OFFICE

The Counsellor in Charge of the Quebec Office in Los Angeles assumed his duties on December 2, 1969. He reported that the organization of his office is now completed.

His principal activities in the six-month reporting period have been to:

- Make out lists of industrials in the secondary and the primary sectors;
- Send out literature to the above-mentioned industries to let them know of the Quebec industrial opportunities;
- Call on several U.S. firms in his area in order to apprise them of the Province of Quebec Incentive Programs for new operations;
- Give information to several American commercial and industrial concerns on how to operate a business in Quebec.

Our Counsellor has also maintained the contacts already established with the business and financial communities, and he has called on many American banks in his area to inform them of the Quebec potential.

LAFAYETTE OFFICE

The Quebec Counsellor in Lafayette whose duty it is to assist the Council for the Development of French in Louisiana and to promote cultural exchanges between the Province of Quebec and the State of Louisiana, reported the following activities for the period of January 1 to June 30:

- He has promoted summer vacations in Quebec for young people interested in learning the French language. As a result several students have spent their vacations in Quebec summer camps;
- He has helped organize a group visit to Jonquière College, in the Province of Quebec, of Louisiana students and teachers interested in the study and /or teaching of French. The preparation of this visit involved film showings, group discussions, distribution of tourist literature, etc.
- He has been instrumental in setting up the Quebec-Louisiana Committee responsible to put into practice the cultural and educational agreements between the two governments;
- He has established contacts with several representatives of the mass media.

11. ACTIVITIES (Cont'd)

From January 1 until the time he left his post on April 1, the Director of Information was involved in the following activities:

- He coordinated the publicity and information material required for the preparation of the special Section on Quebec published by the Chicago Tribune on March 29. This supplement was sponsored by the Quebec Department of Industry and Commerce;
- He coordinated the mailing of 7,000 "Quebec Land of Opportunity," a brochure addressed to a selected list of businessmen throughout the United States with a view to attracting new industries to Quebec;
- He met with representatives of National Education Television (NET) in New York, to study the possibility of a TV program on Quebec;
- He accompanied the Director of the Quebec Information and Publicity Bureau on a visit to Washington with a view to meeting the information officers at the Canadian Embassy and the United States Information Agency;
- Finally, he helped organize a 15-day visit to Quebec for a group of students from Briarcliff College who were interested in learning more about the education system in Quebec.
