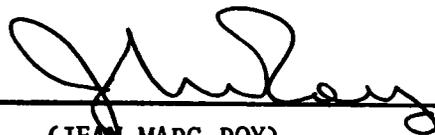

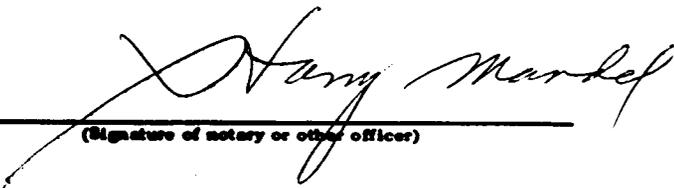

11. ACTIVITIES

NEW YORK OFFICE

As mentioned in Item 2 of the report, the post of Agent General is still vacant and Mr. Jean Marc Roy, the Administrative Director, continues to act as interim.

Mr. Paul Lussier began his work as an Economic Counsellor in the New York Office on September 8, while the new Director of Information, Mr. Fernand Renault, took up his post on November 3. The Short-Form Registration Statements concerning these two officers are annexed to the report.

Our office has maintained its usual activities during the six-month period covered by the report. It has welcomed 6,034 visitors, and answered 10,159 telephone calls from persons wishing to inquire about tourist attractions, skiing conditions, etc. in Quebec, or from investors and other persons wanting general information on the Province.

The Department of Tourism mailed some 6,000 first-class letters containing promotional tourist literature. Between July 1 and December 31, the film service of the Tourist Department has lent 562 films to various schools, libraries and organizations.

The Director of Tourism has made contacts with a great number of travel agents and made a trip to Boston to represent this office at the International Winter Ski and Sports Show on October 22nd-24th. He also attended monthly meetings of the Society of American Travel Writers and the National Organization of Foreign Government Tourist Representatives.

The activities of the Department of Industry and Commerce covered two broad general areas:

1. Industrial Development - Assisting multi-national corporations and individuals in developing plans for new projects and/or expansion of existing projects located in the Province of Quebec. Most of these firms and individuals possess corporate headquarters in the New York area.

Besides developing plans and obtaining information to assist these projects, a considerable part of this section's activity was devoted to liaison work with various departments of the Quebec and Canadian governments, as well as with Canadian financial institutions.

2. Market Development - The activity of this section was concentrated in assisting Quebec-based manufacturers to export their products for sale in the American market.

During this period, we officially established a "Quebec Trade Center," using existing facilities at Rockefeller Center, whereby Quebec manufacturers are provided with exhibit space, showroom and office facilities, etc.

11. ACTIVITIES (Cont'd)BOSTON OFFICE

The Counsellor in charge of the Boston office reports that during the six-month period of the report he has:

- met with industrial and commercial prospects, participated in reunions, committees, meetings and conventions;
- made various contacts by telephone calls, letters, or office visits;
- delivered 3 lectures to various organizations and visited or participated in 9 industrial and commercial shows.

In addition he has handled several industrial, commercial, touristic and cultural inquiries. He has established contacts between Quebec firms and American distributors or manufacturers' representatives, and he has also established close contacts with the representatives of the major banks and several representatives of the mass media in his region.

Finally, the Counsellor in Boston reports that he has been appointed treasurer of the Grasshopper Committee of Boston, and that he has joined the International Center of New England.

CHICAGO OFFICE

The activities of the Quebec Government Office in Chicago covered:

1. Industrial Development - Three American firms previously contacted by the office have set up manufacturing facilities in Quebec during the six-month period, or have begun construction on such plants. Nine companies are seriously considering establishing manufacturing operations in the Province of Quebec, while ten are considering some form of association with Quebec firms for the manufacture and sale of their products in Canada. One firm is planning an industrial park development project in Quebec. The Economic Counsellor of the Chicago Office has had consultations with these and some 30 other U.S. firms concerning industrial development and the economic, commercial and industrial scene in Quebec. The office has also answered many inquiries from businessmen and the general public on various fields peripheral to trade and industry.
2. Trade Promotion - The Economic Counsellor of the Chicago Office helped organize and coordinate the Quebec Food Mission, which brought representatives of seven Quebec food manufacturers to Chicago and Detroit where they met with local food brokers and wholesalers. They reported substantive contacts leading in many cases to agreements with representatives and buyers. The office also helped seven Quebec manufacturers in various fields wishing to sell their products in the United States, and three seeking sources of supply in this country. The Economic Counsellor attended various trade shows in order to familiarize himself with commercial and trade trends and opportunities.

11. ACTIVITIES (Cont'd)

The Chicago Office also maintained and extended its contacts with various professional and industrial organizations, banks and groups and individuals involved in industrial promotion, commerce, and international trade.

DALLAS OFFICE

The Counsellor in charge of the Quebec Office in Dallas reports that during the period of July 1 to December 31, 1970, he discussed the possibilities of establishing manufacturing operations in Canada, particularly in Quebec - with fifteen American companies. As a result one company established a plant with an investment of about \$7 million. Several other companies have inquired about possible investment in Quebec, either by acquiring existing manufacturing concerns, businesses or real estate.

The Dallas Office was in touch with three firms looking for licensees to manufacture their products in Canada, and helped two Quebec manufacturers investigate the possibilities of having their products manufactured under license in the United States. The office also answered five inquiries asking for assistance in marketing Quebec products in Southwest U.S.

Our representative in Dallas visited several exhibitions and trade shows, among which were the American Hospital Association Exhibition, in Houston, and the Southwestern Shoe Travellers Association Show, in Dallas; he also attended the convention of the Independent Petroleum Association of America in Dallas. He travelled extensively in Texas, as well as in Oklahoma and Louisiana.

The Quebec Government participated in the Fall Gift, Jewelry and Houseware Show held at the Market Hall, in Dallas, where six Quebec manufacturers exhibited their products. Quebec also participated in the State Fair of Texas. The emphasis was on natural resources, mines, the pulp and paper industry, and tourist attractions. October 14th was "Quebec Day" at the State Fair.

In October, the Quebec minister of Industry and Commerce presided at the official opening of the Dallas Office. A reception for some 100 guests was held on that occasion.

During the period covered by the report, the Counsellor in Dallas has maintained the contacts already established and he made new ones with the major banks and the Chamber of Commerce in Dallas, as well as with the banks and Chambers of Commerce of the various cities he has visited during that period.

11. ACTIVITIES (Cont'd)LOS ANGELES

For the six-month period of the report, the activities of the Counsellor in Charge of the Quebec Office in Los Angeles, were mainly to:

- Complete the organization of the office filing system;
- Set up and organize a library for the office, and for consultation by persons interested in learning about Quebec;
- Complete mailing lists of businessmen and industrials in primary and secondary sectors to whom literature on Quebec industrial opportunities was sent;
- Visit American banks in his region to inform them of Quebec potential;
- Visit industrials to inform them of the Province of Quebec incentive programs on new operations;
- Give general information to American commercial and industrial concerns on how to operate a business in Quebec.

LAFAYETTE

As regards the activities of the above-mentioned office, the Counsellor in Charge reports that between July 1 and December 31 1970 he accompanied 126 young Louisianians on a five-week trip to Quebec. He placed half of these young people in Summer camps, on a rotation basis, and half at the Jonquière, Qué. CEGEP (Collège d'Enseignement Général et Professionnel) where they registered for classes and gained six college credits.

The Lafayette representative was instrumental in the creation of six local chapters of CODOFIL (Council for the Development of French in Louisiana), and in the planning of fourteen more.

He organized and led a visit to Louisiana of the Quebec Commissioner-General for the Cooperation with the Exterior, and of the Head of the Bureau Amérique of that same Government.

Finally, our representative in Lafayette, reports that he kept a close liaison with the Canadian Consul General and the French Consul General, in New Orleans, and with the Quebec Government Counsellor in charge of the Dallas, Texas, office. He also worked in close relationship with TIRAA (The International Relations Association of Acadians).
