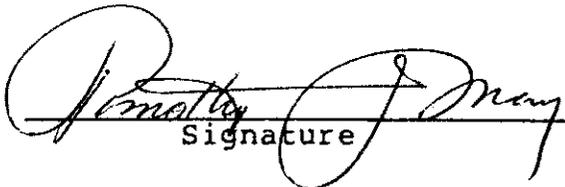

REPUBLIC OF HAITI.
