



The activities engaged in and on behalf of the principal are (1) promoting tourism and travel to and within Queensland, Australia; (2) providing tourism and travel information services; (3) encouraging the development of the Queensland Tourist and travel industry; and (4) advising the Queensland minister for maritime services and tourism regarding the foregoing.

The Los Angeles office of the Queensland Tourist and Travel Corporation is a non-selling, non-profit office established to promote tourism for the Australian State of Queensland.

Promotion is in the nature of education for the benefit of the North American Travel Industry and the individual consumer. The information conveyed includes statistical types of information, description of travel facilities within Queensland (e.g. resort and hotel facility, means of travel within the State, etc.) and general advice to those traveling to Queensland.

Promotion takes place through the circulation of literature and brochures, programs to inform journalists traveling to Queensland, video programs and television specials. In addition, office facilities are available to assist the public seeking more information about travel and recreation opportunities in the State of Queensland.

Towards that end, Queensland Tourist and Travel Corporation employs a fulfillment house which distributes pamphlets and brochures to individuals and companies who call a special toll free number seeking more information about travel opportunities within the State of Queensland. Attached hereto is a listing of the total number of information kits that were mailed by the fulfillment house to consumers seeking information about travel opportunities in the State of Queensland.

All brochures that are distributed as part of this fulfillment activity have been previously submitted to the justice department with earlier registration statements, with the exception of the brochure enclosed herewith.

Additionally, attached hereto is a detailed description of a Trade Show that the Queensland Tourist and Travel Corporation hosted in cooperation with Qantas Airways.

Sunbathe, swim, snorkel, fish, windsurf and explore uninhabited islands. At night, call into a resort for dinner or drop anchor in a sheltered cove and barbecue the day's catch under the stars on a deserted beach — the rest of the world will seem a million miles away!

Bareboat charters are available from most Queensland coastal centers but most operate in the Whitsunday area.

### **Cruises**

Cruises with the Reef and islands as ports of call operate from Cairns, Townsville, the Whitsunday Coast and Mackay. You could spend between two and thirteen days cruising in the lap of luxury in a private air-conditioned cabin, or take an adventure cruise and camp on an island each night.

Houseboats can be hired at the Gold Coast, Sunshine Coast, Hervey Bay, Cardwell and Atherton Tableland.


The **Gold Coast's** houseboating territory includes sheltered bays and lagoons, beaches and 26 islands.

Houseboating on the **Sunshine Coast** offers the choice of sheltered bay waters or the lakes, rivers and everglades of the Noosa River/Cooloola National Park area — more than 31 miles (50km) of waterways.

**Hervey Bay** shelters behind Fraser Island, so a houseboat holiday at the Bay adds Fraser Island's natural beauty to Hervey Bay's great fishing, restaurants and tourist attractions.

**Hinchinbrook Channel**, at Cardwell, offers an almost unlimited area for cruising, fishing and crabbing between the beautiful beaches of the mainland and the lush green of Hinchinbrook Island, the world's largest island national park.

Lake Tinaroo, on the **Atherton Tableland**, has more than 180 miles (300km) of shoreline — that's a lot of tropical beauty!





### Holidays on Uninhabited Islands

Along the Queensland coast there are hundreds of islands, most of them uninhabited. In Whitsunday Passage alone there are 50 tropical paradises just begging for footprints in their smooth white sands.

Many of these islands are national parks, and on some, facilities have been provided — water tanks, shelter sheds, showers, toilets, barbecues and picnic tables.

If this is your sort of holiday, you can arrange for a cruise boat to 'cast you away' on an island and pick you up at a later date. You'll need a permit for camping if the island is a national park, and food and water if there is none on the island, as well as extra supplies in case bad weather prevents your pick-up on the arranged date, and — just in case — distress flares.



## Getting Back To Nature

The Great Barrier Reef, the second largest wilderness area on earth, unique forms of flora and fauna, millions of acres of national park.

These are just a few of the reasons why it's great getting back to nature in Queensland.

### National Parks

Queensland's national parks include terrains ranging from almost impenetrable tropical rainforest to stark sandblasted desert. All have been preserved because they have one or more of the following attributes: outstanding scenic, scientific, historic or recreational interest.

The first Queensland national park was declared in 1908, and the State now has more than 1.3 million acres (3.2 million ha) of park, plus 12,100 acres (30,000ha) of fauna reserve and 16,600 acres (41,000ha) of environmental park. Walking tracks, camping areas, picnic tables, barbecues and other facilities have been provided in many national parks, and in (or near) some there are resorts/guesthouses.

Some of Queensland's best-known national parks are: **Lamington**, **Springbrook/Natural Arch** and **Mt. Tamborine** — extensive areas of rainforest with waterfalls, ferns and wild orchids in the Gold Coast's mountainous hinterland; **Girraween** in the Southern Border Region, famous for its wildflowers and curious rock formations; the **Bunya Mountains** near Kingaroy — habitat of the unique Queensland Bunya Pine; most of Queensland's islands including **Hinchinbrook** — the world's largest island national park; the Atherton Tableland's **Crater Lakes** in Far North Queensland; and **Carnarvon**, in central Queensland, an oasis with rare ferns and palms, wildlife, sandstone cliffs and extensive galleries of Aboriginal art.


### Visiting National Parks

Plant and animal life in national parks is totally protected. Visitors are asked to observe the following rules:

- *Keep to the walking tracks. They are designed to lead to the more outstanding features without damaging the park.*
- *Don't remove plants, seeds, stones or any other natural materials from the park.*
- *Dogs, cats and other domestic animals are prohibited.*
- *Don't interfere with native animals.*
- *Take care with fire.*
- *Don't litter.*

Camping permits should be applied for in advance. If visitors without permits arrive at peak times, they may have to be turned away because of lack of camping sites.

### Adventure/Outdoor Holidays

Take a trip to the very top of Australia, see crocodiles in the wild, stay on one of Australia's legendary Outback stations, trek by four-wheel drive to places few other people have seen, go pig shooting or barramundi fishing, go on safari in a DC5... Queensland is an adventure!

### Off-road Driving

Four-wheel drives are usually for hire in areas where this is popular. Four-wheel drives are common on some long and fairly remote stretches of beach such as **Rainbow Beach** on the Sunshine Coast and on islands such as **Fraser** and **Moreton** which have uninterrupted stretches of sand. Permits are available from the local council; there may be a small charge.

Many Queensland State Forests feature **Forest Drives** which are well signposted (most are



## On The Road

One of the most popular ways of seeing Queensland is on your own four- or two- wheels. Take the highways to the major attractions or 'get off the beaten track' — see Queensland your way.

### Rental Cars

The well-known national companies (for example: **Hertz**, **Avis**, **Budget**, **Thrifty**, **Manx** and **General**) are represented in most Queensland centers. In Brisbane, larger regional cities and major resort centers there is usually also a choice of local rental car operators.

Rental charges don't include gas, but usually allow "unlimited mileage (kilometers)" — there is no charge per mile (km) for distance traveled. If you are renting a car in one area and returning it in another, there may be a drop off fee.

In country areas, rates will be higher, and it is wise to book in advance.

To rent a car, you must have a current driver's licence and must be over 21 years of age.

### Campervans

Campervans (2-3 berths) and motorhomes (4-6 berths) bring even more flexibility and independence to a holiday on the road.

Most vehicles have a refrigerator, sink, gas stove, closet, convertible beds and a water tank, and some have a shower and toilet. The daily rate usually includes linen, cutlery and tableware and allows unlimited kilometers, but fuel is extra. Most companies also impose a minimum hire period.



### Caravans/Trailers

They can be hired at several places in Queensland — your travel agent will be able to supply details of hirers.

Alternatively, travel without the restrictions of towing a van and rent an on-site van at a caravan park each night. Most of Queensland's caravan parks offer on-site vans, some with private shower and toilet.

There are caravan parks in most Queensland centers. Facilities vary from park to park — some are fairly basic and priced accordingly — and may offer only communal shower, toilet, laundry and perhaps a barbecue in addition to the site. The majority are of higher standard with electricity available at each van site, a shop supplying food and gas refills, etc, an ice dispensing machine, and higher standard laundry/toilets/showers. The top of the range parks also have a swimming pool, restaurant, television lounge, ensuite shower/toilet. Some caravan parks also have cabins.

### Bicycles

Not the way to see the whole of Queensland — unless you're incredibly fit and have lots of time — but a great way to see a city, a region, or something like Brisbane's Botanic Gardens.

Special cycling holidays are available. For example on the Atherton Tableland, near Cairns — eight days bicycling along rainforest tracks by day, staying at country 'pubs' overnight — or, for the really enthusiastic cyclist, a 26-day trip from Cairns to Cape York and back.

### Roadside Rest Areas

There are more than 250 Main Roads Rest Areas in Queensland — safe areas where vehicles can stop. Toilets, water, fireplaces, picnic tables and shelters are provided at most and overnight stops/camping are permitted (unless otherwise indicated by signs) for up to 48 hours at each rest area in a calendar month.

The Main Roads Department produces a *Guide to Queensland Roads* which includes a listing of rest areas and their facilities. The MRD head office is at Boundary Street, Spring Hill, Brisbane, Qld 4000. Phone (07) 834 2011.

### Road Rules

In Australia, vehicles drive on the left-hand side of the road. Queensland road rules are in most cases similar to those of other Australian states.

*Speed Limits:* 55mph (60kmh) maximum in built up areas, 60 mph (100kmh) maximum elsewhere unless otherwise posted.

*Driver's License:* all drivers are advised to carry a license with them although they are allowed 48 hours to produce it if required by a police officer.

*Seat Belts:* Each vehicle occupant must, by law, be correctly restrained in either an adult seat belt, child restraint or child harness where available.

### Fuel and Repairs

In the cities and towns and on the main highways gas, oil, maps and toilet facilities are available and tire and repair services are generally not too far away. However, it's always a good idea to check the distance between country towns — you may need to fill up your fuel tank before setting out.

In the more remote areas of Queensland — such as the far west, the Gulf and Cape York — it is wise to carry extra food and water in case you are stranded by a breakdown. You may also need to carry extra fuel if it is not available en route. Seek local advice, and if required, advise someone (such as the local police officer) where you are traveling and when you expect to be back, and check in on your return.

Gas station hours in Queensland are usually 7am-6pm Monday to Friday, and 7am-noon on Saturday. On weekends and public holidays, stations on roster generally open 7am-6pm, or later. All stations are closed on Christmas Day, Good Friday and Anzac Day — except 24 hour stations.


In larger centers, the stations on roster are listed in the newspaper on Saturday. Stations which open 24 hours a day are located on the main highways and close to major population centers. Further afield there are garages with a night bell for after-hours service.

### Matilda Highway

This is the highway connecting Charleville in the south central-west to Karumba on the coast of the Gulf of Carpentaria. Matilda Highway which extends approximately 900 miles (1600kms), passes through the stark beauty of the Outback landscape, and any trip along it will put you up close to more kangaroos, brolgas (an Australian bird) and emus than a lifetime of zoo visiting.

The towns along the way — places like Blackall, Barcaldine, Longreach, Winton, Cloncurry, Normanton and dozens of others, large and small — have individual character but have many things in common too, not the least being the ever-important pub.

Places of interest include the John Flynn Memorial at Cloncurry which is dedicated to the early missionary who founded the Royal Flying Doctor Service. This important operation provides a mantle of safety for the people of Inland Australia.

Normanton's Railway Station which stands isolated at the edge of town is also worth visiting. The historic two carriage 'Gulflander' train operates weekly services to Croydon and return.

Traveling through the Outback on a sealed highway like the Matilda is safe, but do remember to take plenty of drinking water with you. If you have a breakdown, stay with your car — Outback hospitality and friendship will produce a Good Samaritan in the form of a fellow traveler.



## Special Interest Holidays/Activities

Queensland's wonderful climate is perfect year-round for all activities — except those that require snow!

Here are some ideas on the sort of activities available in Queensland — many of them, too, are available as packaged holidays. Your travel agent will be able to supply details.

### Land-related

**Abseiling.** There are many suitable locations throughout Queensland including the mountainous national parks in south-east Queensland, some of which are within an hour's drive of the capital, Brisbane. Binna Burra Lodge in **Lamington National Park** in south-east Queensland includes abseiling among its guest activities, with abseiling classes for beginners, and regular bushwalking/abseiling expeditions for more experienced climbers.

**Archaeology.** Aboriginal settlement in Queensland is believed to go back more than 19,000 years — before the pyramids were built. Throughout Queensland there are reminders of Aboriginal habitation, including rock paintings and stencils.

Stenciling is particularly significant archaeologically because it shows the exact shape and size of weapons, household items, etc. Historic sites in Queensland are cared for by the Department of Community Services Department & Ethnic Affairs, 35 Charlotte Street, Brisbane, Qld 4000. **Ballooning.** Queensland provides ideal conditions for ballooning, a sport which is growing in popularity. Contact the Queensland Balloon and Airship Club, 32 Raelene Terrace, Springwood, 4127. Take a hot air balloon trip at dawn followed by a champagne breakfast — packages are available which include travel from Brisbane to Gatton in the Brisbane Valley and the Atherton Tablelands in Far North Queensland.

**Bushwalking/Hiking/Climbing.** Popular activities, due to Queensland's pleasant climate and varied terrains. Contact the Brisbane Bushwalkers Club G., P.O. Box 1949, Brisbane, Qld 4001. Phone 61 7 856 4050.

**Cars.** In Queensland there are associations formed by enthusiasts for most makes of cars

and historic vehicles. There are clubs in many Queensland centers but most are concentrated in south-east Queensland where the major event on the calendar of many societies is the annual sports car meeting at McLean's Bridge, south of Brisbane on the Mt. Lindesay Highway, on Mother's Day (the second Sunday in May). It attracts many exotic open and coupe cars from more than a dozen clubs. **Cricket.** A reminder of Australia's British heritage. Queensland's cricket season, about six months long, begins in October. **Flying/Gliding/Skydiving/Paraflying/  
Hang Gliding.**

*Flying.* Aircraft are available for charter in most Queensland centers, and regular joy flights operate from some resort centers (loop the loop over the Gold Coast in a Tiger Moth, or fly over the Great Barrier Reef from several places along the coast, for example). Air safaris can include travel aboard an historic DC3. Your travel agent can supply more details on this type of holiday.

*Gliding.* Many world gliding records have been set in Australia. Most parts of Queensland are suitable for gliding, particularly west of the Great Dividing Range where air currents are ideal. For more details contact a local club such as the Boonah Gliding Club, P.O. Box 107, Boonah, Qld 4310. Phone (weekend)— (075) 63 2630.

*Skydiving/parachuting* is done wherever there is an airport with planes for charter. Toogoolawah, north-west of Brisbane, is the center of parachuting in south-east Queensland and has hosted the national championships. *Paraflying* is done at most resort centers including the Gold Coast, Brisbane and the islands listed on p. 6.

*Hang Gliding.* Queensland has many spectacular locations for this activity — in fact it is regarded as one of the best locations in the world. October is the most important month on the hang gliding calendar. Several competitions then take place in the **Far North** and at **Eungella National Park** west of Mackay. For more details contact Queensland Hang Gliding Association, Solandra Street, Alexandra Hills, Qld 4161. Phone (07) 824 2508.

**Football.** Four types of football are played in Queensland: **Australian Rules, Rugby League, Rugby Union** and **Soccer**. The Aussie Rules season is April through September; Rugby League and Rugby Union February to September; Soccer April to October. Matches are publicized in the media and televised regularly.

**Gemstones/Fossicking.** Sapphires and opals are the most sought after.

The **Central Queensland Gemfields** west of Rockhampton are the largest sapphire-

producing fields in the world. Many amateur fossickers have made worthwhile finds, too. From **Winton** in central western Queensland an 'opal belt' extends south to the New South Wales border. Precious opal is found in this area.

Queensland also has innumerable areas where gold, semi-precious gemstones and minerals can be found. Contact the Department of Mines for more information including details of how to obtain a Miner's Right. They are at 61 Mary Street, Brisbane, Qld 4000. Phone (07) 224 2111.

**Golf.** Universally popular and even remote towns usually have a course of some sort. Queensland also has many golf resorts. Golf clubs are usually open to members only, but reciprocal rights extend to members of other clubs — visitors should carry a letter of introduction from their club. Green fees are about \$10-\$16 a game for visitors at top quality metropolitan courses, and even less on country courses. A separate brochure on golf in Queensland is available from the Queensland Tourist & Travel Corporation — see addresses on p. 77

**History.** Queensland has many historic sites, including those which date from convict days in the 1820s. Some are listed under the regional headings in Queensland's Tourist Regions, p. 27-65. **Horse racing** is a popular pastime and meetings are scheduled every Saturday and sometimes on weekdays in larger centers. In less populated areas of the State the local race meeting is an annual event, attracting people from hundreds of miles away. The Birdsville Race meet, held every September for more than a century, is Queensland's best-known country race meeting. The highlight of Queensland's yearly horse-racing program is the Brisbane Winter Racing Carnival, May to July, which attracts top race-horses and thousands of visitors from all over Australia.

**Horse Trails.** A national horse trail has been developed, starting at Cooktown in Far North Queensland and extending south to Melbourne. It encompasses a variety of terrains — rain-forests, rugged mountains, flat dry plains, snow-capped alps, and beaches, and will also be suitable for use by bushwalkers, joggers and cyclists. More details from the National Horse Trail Committee, G.P.O. Box 1, Brisbane, Qld 4001.

Trail riding is available for guests at Queensland resorts including **Dunk Island** in North Queensland, **'Cherrabah'** in the Darling Downs/Southern Border Region, and others.

**Lawn Bowls.** There are close to 80,000 bowlers in Queensland, and more than 340 clubs. Visitors are welcome; green fees are usually only a couple of dollars. The Winter Bowls Carnival in south-east Queensland July-August is a major competition event attended by bowlers from Australia and overseas. **Rodeos.** Often, like race meetings, a major sporting and social occasion in many centers. Visitors are always welcome at these colorful events.

**Tennis.** There are very few centers without courts, and at most, lighting is provided for night games, and racket and balls can be hired.

The Queensland Lawn Tennis Association is the State headquarters. International tennis tournaments sometimes held at Milton, include the Davis Cup in winter (about July) and the Women's Panasonic in November. For more details contact the Queensland Lawn Tennis Association, Milton Road, Milton, Qld 4064. Phone (07) 368 2433.

**Trains.** Historic trains still in operation, train museums and vintage train trips — you'll find them all in Queensland. The railway from **Cairns to Kuranda** in Far North Queensland has operated as a day trip for tourists since the 1950s; its historic timber carriages with pressed metal ceilings have recently been restored.

The **'Gulflander'** train in the Gulf Savannah Region (see p. 57) has been operating between Normanton and Croydon since 1891. One unusual feature of this railway is its steel sleepers and the way they were laid — the U-shaped metal sleepers, cast in Scotland, were packed with mud to make them less susceptible to flood damage. Since 1922, the railway has been operated by a 'tin hare' rail motor. The Panhard rail-motor which operated the 'Gulflander' from 1922-1941 is now in the **Steam Locomotive Museum** at Redbank, just west of Brisbane in the Greater Brisbane Region, along with other historic locos used by Queensland's railways for more than 50 years.

There is also a **Tramway Museum** at Aramac in the Outback Queensland Region.

The Australian Railway Historical Society, Queensland Division, in conjunction with Queensland Railways, operates regular **steam train trips** from Brisbane to places of interest in South-East Queensland. For more information contact the Society at G.P.O. box 682, Brisbane, Qld 4001 or phone (07) 371 4231 (recorded information on tours) or phone (07) 349 4517.





### Water-Related

Queensland has 3,120 miles (5,200km) of coastline plus lakes, dams and rivers. So sailing, para-flying, water-skiing, fishing (including game fishing), jet-skiing, snorkeling, powerboating, canoeing, kayaking, scuba diving, swimming, surfing, cruising and just about any other water sport you can name are popular, year-round.

**Bareboating.** See *The Great Barrier Reef*, p. 12.

**Canoeing/River Rafting.** There are many waterways in Queensland ideal for canoe cruising or whitewater canoeing. **Tully Gorge** in North Queensland is an internationally known whitewater competition area, and **Tinaroo Dam**, further north, has hosted the Australian Slalom and Wildwater Championships.

Canoeing safaris operate in Far North Queensland from March to October each year — for details, contact your travel agent.

**Diving.** Queensland has good diving locations the length of its coast, plus the Great Barrier Reef. Tank refills are available at most coastal centers and at many resorts. See also *Dive Holidays* p. 7. A separate brochure on *Diving in Queensland* is published by the Queensland Tourist & Travel Corporation — see addresses listed p. 77.


**Fishing.** Queensland is one of the best big game fishing locations in the world. That's why Lee Marvin came to Queensland every year — to fish for marlin. When it comes to other types of fishing Queensland is also outstanding. It is probably unparalleled for variety of fish and angling locations.

*Fishing in Queensland*, available from the Queensland Tourist & Travel Corporation (see addresses on p. 77), contains details of Queensland's great fishing, including fishing resorts and safaris.

**Sailing/sailboarding.** Queensland has a choice of locations for these sports — lakes, estuaries, sheltered coastal waters, rivers and the open sea. There are clubs and craft for hire in most areas where sailing is popular. Sailboarding, relatively unknown a few years ago, is now a major sport. Sailboards can be hired at most resorts and are included in equipment supplied on some bareboat charters.

**Shell Collecting.** See *The Great Barrier Reef*, p. 7.

**Surfing.** Because the Great Barrier Reef breaks the impact of the Pacific surf, the best surfing beaches in Queensland are south of Gladstone, particularly from Fraser Island south, on the Sunshine and Gold Coasts. Most beaches are patrolled by surf lifesavers and their regular carnivals are always colorful — contact the Surf Life Saving Association, Evelyn Street, Newstead, Qld 4006 (phone (07) 852 1496) for details. Board surfing is also a popular participant/spectator sport. The major annual board surfing event, the **Stubbie Surf Classic** at Burleigh Heads, Gold Coast, each November, attracts international and interstate entrants. Water temperatures vary only slightly from summer to winter, so many people surf year round.

**Koala Town**, Pacific Highway, Oxenford. Cuddle a koala and see many of the favorites that make Old MacDonald famous. There's sheep shearing and horse shoeing, international dancing stallions, many live animal shows, craft markets and even crocodile feeding, free entry. Open 9:30-5:00 each day, except Christmas. **Sea World**, The Spit, Main Beach, Australia's premier marine attraction. Other features of this international hotel complex include several restaurants, and the International Showroom where the world's top box office stars appear in dazzling production shows. **Olsens Bird Gardens.** Creek Rd, Currumbin Valley. Native and exotic birds in landscaped walk-through aviaries. Rainforest walks, nursery, and Glasshouse Tearoom. Phone (075) 33 0208.

**Currumbin Sanctuary.** Gold Coast Hwy, Currumbin. Thirty acres of parkland with kangaroos, koalas, other native animals, and a variety of native birds. Currumbin Sanctuary is famous for the flocks of rainbow lorikeets which fly in daily to be fed. Phone (075) 34 1266.

**Lamington National Park.** 'The Green behind the Gold'. Close to 50,000 acres (20,000ha) of mountainous national park just a short drive from the Gold Coast. Lamington features 500 waterfalls, thick rainforest, 3000 year old Antarctic beech trees, more than 87 miles (140km) of walking tracks, and two resorts — O'Reilly's and Binna Burra. Popular for abseiling, bushwalking and mountain climbing.

**Kooralbyn Valley Resort,** off the Mount Lindesay Highway in the Gold Coast hinterland, is a unique leisure-oriented tourist development. Resort facilities include a licensed motel, private villas, country club, championship golf course, tennis courts, an Equestrian and Polo Center, lakes, swimming pools, bowling greens and an airstrip. **Accommodation:** The Gold Coast is Queensland's major resort, offering all levels of accommodation from camping grounds to a choice of five star international standard hotels.




Surrounded by hills and nestled near beautiful Moreton Bay, this cosmopolitan city boasts 10 miles (16km) of meandering river, beautiful parks and gardens, a unique blend of historical buildings and sophisticated architecture, a magnificent new Cultural Complex, more than 550 restaurants, a relaxed lifestyle and many more surprises.

**Location:** In south-east Queensland.

**Population:** 1,200,000

**Main Industries:** Brisbane is the center of government and finance, manufacturing and trade. Other important industries include transport, retailing, construction, utilities and tourism.

### **Attractions**

In addition to hundreds of attractions within the city, Brisbane is also close enough for day trips to the Gold and Sunshine Coasts, the 'garden city' Toowoomba, and the islands of Moreton Bay. Some of Brisbane's attractions include:

**GPO Museum,** 1st Floor, 261 Queen St, City. the history of post and telecommunications in Queensland. The display includes antique telephone, morse and radio equipment. Phone (07) 224 1215.





**The Australian Woolshed.** 148 Samford Road, Ferny Hills. The great Aussie Outback experience, close to the city center. See the famous trained rams, a shearer in action and the star sheepdogs at work. Meet the friendly live koala family, feed the kangaroos and wallabies. There's also Australia's top award winning souvenir and craft shop, and great Aussie 'tucker' food from the licensed restaurant. Phone (07) 351 5366.

**Kookaburra Queen, Paddlewheeler.** Departs from The Pier, Waterfront Place, corner of Creek and Eagle Streets. Cruise the Brisbane River aboard this elegant paddlewheeler Kookaburra Queen II. Meals and refreshments served on board, licensed. Phone (07) 221 1300.

**Shopping.** With seven day a week trading, Brisbane now has the best shopping hours of any city in Australia — from 8:15am to 5:30pm Monday to Friday, 8:15am to 4:00pm Saturday, and optional on Sunday. Most city-heart shops are open 10:00am to 4:00pm Sunday. Late night shopping in the city area Friday until 9:00pm, in the suburbs on Thursday to 9:00pm.

**Queensland Maritime Museum,** Stanley St, South Brisbane. The Historic South Brisbane dry dock, engines, buoys, the steam tug 'Forceful' and the World War II frigate 'Diamantina'. Phone (07) 844 5361.

**Earlstreet Historical Village,** 75 McIlwraith Ave, Norman Park. Historic Queensland buildings including a general store, a slab hut, a century-old cottage, a 'pub' and a magnificent colonial home in two acres of natural bushland. Phone (07) 398 6866.

**Newstead House,** Breakfast Creek Rd, Newstead. Brisbane's oldest surviving home, built in 1846, with appropriate furnishings. Phone (07) 52 7373.

**Miegunyah,** 31 Jordan Tce, Bowen Hills. A historic home restored and furnished as a memorial to the pioneer women of Queensland. Phone (07) 52 2979.

**Panaroo's Playthings,** 401 Lutwyche Rd, Windsor. A doll and toy collection with more than 8000 items. Phone (07) 57 8893.

**Beautiful Brisbane River.** The Brisbane River meanders through the heart of the city and into the suburbs. An extensive ferry service is in operation.



**Nightlife:** Brisbane has all the choice of nightlife one would expect in a major city — discos, nightclubs, 24 hour restaurants, theaters, theater restaurants, cinemas, tours and cruises.

**Accommodation:** There is plenty of accommodation available in the inner city including motels, budget-priced hotels, apartments, and international standard hotels. Close to the city there are hotels, motels, apartments, and caravan parks. A home-host scheme is also in operation.

**Activities:** Archery, bicycling (inner and near-city bike tracks), boating (on the river or the bay), bushwalking (just 5 miles / 5km from the city heart), canoeing, diving, fishing (one of the world's best light tackle gamefishing grounds), flying, gliding, grass skiing, golf, horse riding, hot air ballooning, kayaking, rock climbing, parachuting, skydiving, sailing, skating (roller and ice), squash, swimming, tennis, ten pin bowling, water skiing.

**Access:** Brisbane has domestic and international airports. Several major highways meet in Brisbane, providing easy connections to State-wide and interstate road systems. Rail services link Brisbane with other capital cities and most places in Queensland.

**Islands.** Moreton Bay, just 20 miles (32km) downstream from Brisbane, is 642 square miles (1036km<sup>2</sup>) of sparkling water dotted with islands. The largest islands are **Bribie**,

**Moreton** and **North Stradbroke**, noted for their high sandhills, freshwater lakes, wild-flower heaths, surfing and stillwater beaches, and good fishing and snorkeling areas. All three islands can be reached by air or by sea, and Bribie also is connected to the mainland by bridge. Bribie and North Stradbroke feature a choice of **holiday accommodation** including beach house, resort, apartment and motel.

Moreton Island has a resort, **Tangalooma**. All the islands have camping areas, and Bribie and North Stradbroke Islands have caravan parks too. Other bay islands include **St. Helena**, a former convict prison, and **Macleay**, **Lamb**, **Karragarra**, **Russell**, and **Coochie**, which also offers self-contained apartment accommodation. Bay cruises operate from Brisbane and the Redlands area.

**Redlands area** just south-east of Brisbane on Moreton Bay offers a variety of activities including sailing and fishing, a choice of accommodation, including motels and caravan parks, excellent restaurants, and a wide range of attractions.

**Ormiston House**, one of Queensland's oldest homes, built around 1860 by Captain Louis Hope, pioneer of Queensland's sugar industry. The restored house and gardens are open to the public March to November. Phone (07) 286 1425.

**Redlands Museum**, Long St, Cleveland. Fascinating records of this historic area. Phone (07) 286 1007 for more information.

#### **Logan City area:**

**Daisy Hill Forest Park.** A popular picnicking, bushwalking and horse riding area with more than 430 acres (174ha) of natural forest.

#### **Ipswich/Moreton area:**

**Ipswich**, the oldest provincial city in Queensland, features an unrivaled collection of magnificent historic buildings. First settled in 1827, Ipswich today is the largest and most diversified manufacturing city in Queensland, after Brisbane.

**Grandchester**, just west of Ipswich, is rich in history. The Grandchester Sawmill with its 1911 steam engine, St Brigid's Church at Rosewood, the Marburg Seminary and the Harrisville His-

torical Museum all offer the opportunity for visitors to experience history in a delightful rural atmosphere.

#### **Boonah area:**


**Boonah** is in the heart of the rich Fassifern Valley, a noted agricultural region.

**Lake Moogerah**, near Boonah, is popular for water sports. It also has picnic and camping areas.

**'Yarramalong' Recreation Center**, near Boonah, is a 60 acre (24 hectares) property bordered by Lake Moogerah and two national parks. Activities include trail riding, riding lessons, canoeing, bushwalking in the nearby Scenic Rim area, archery, and abseiling. 'Yarramalong' also has a camping area. Phone (075) 63 7369.

**The Land of Green Ginger**, Lake Moogerah, is a mountain hideaway in 20 acres (8 hectares) of natural bushland overlooking Lake Moogerah. Guests at the lodge have a choice of activities: water sports on the lake, mountaineering, bird watching, pony-trekking, or simple relaxation. The air is fresh, the cuisine superb, and the wines are special. The lodge has a large lounge dining area opening onto a verandah, and all bedrooms have an en suite bathroom.


# The Great Barrier Reef

Australia's Great Barrier Reef, the largest and most complex expanse of coral reefs in the world, extends along the Queensland coast for more than 1,250 miles (2,000km). It is the earth's most massive structure created by living creatures, covering a total area of about 100,000 square miles (260,000km<sup>2</sup>). It comprises more than 2,000 individual coral reefs and 71 coral islands. There are about 400 species of coral and more than 1,500 species of fish on the Great Barrier Reef.

The Great Barrier Reef first began forming more than 10,000 years ago, and it is still developing. It is a miracle of survival and engineering, created by millions of coral polyps, tiny limestone-secreting marine animals.

For more than 200 years "The Reef", as it is affectionately known, has been a source of fascination to sailors, fishermen, scientists and, more recently, tourists.

In 1976 the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority was formed to protect this unique park — most of which is under water.





### How to get to the Reef

Access to the Reef is easy from most places along the Queensland coast. You can stay right on top of the Reef on a coral cay resort or a vessel. Alternatively, cruise or fly to the Reef from an island resort or from the Queensland coast. All Reef trips operate with a 'weather permitting' proviso.

### Seeing the Reef

People come from all over the world to see the Great Barrier Reef. After all, it's the world's largest expanse of coral, with unique plant and animal life, in warm clear water with visibility of seldom less than 72 feet (18m) and often up to 180 feet (60m).

Participate or observe! See the Reef with snorkeling or scuba-diving gear, through a glass-bottomed boat or a semi-submersible vessel, from an underwater observatory, or by reef-walking at low tide.

### Shell Collecting

Over 98 percent of the Great Barrier Reef region is now a Marine Park and shell collecting, like all other activities, is currently regulated by special 'zoning' plans which allow people — whether they be fishermen, tourist operators, holiday makers, divers or scientists — to continue to use the Reef in ways which do not damage it.

Visitors should check with the Department of Environment & Conservation for all information relating to the collection of shells in the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park before arrival. P.O. Box 155, North Quay, Brisbane, Qld 4002 Australia.

### Dive Holidays

Dive holidays are available right along the Queensland coast, although most are concentrated, naturally, in the areas near the Reef.

There are several choices available to intending divers — stay at a coral cay with easy access to the Reef daily; stay at an island resort or on the mainland and travel to dive sites daily; or take a shipboard dive holiday for the widest choice of dive locations.

There are also scuba training schools where potential divers can qualify for proficiency certificates. Evidence of internationally recognized diving qualifications must be supplied to resorts and all charter boats by intending scuba divers, so bring your certificate with you. If in doubt

about whether it meets international standards, check with your diving association. It must be a CMAS equivalent.

Scuba refills are available at many mainland centers, islands, and on some vessels, and heavy items like tanks and weight belts can usually be hired.

A separate brochure, *Diving in Queensland*, is available from the Queensland Tourist & Travel Corporation (addresses are on p. 78), and more information can also be obtained from the Queensland Dive Tourism Association of Australia, P.O. Box 518 Hamilton Central, Qld, Australia 4007. Phone (07) 854 1424.

### Caution!

From December to March venomous 'sea wasps' known as box jelly fish are found along the north Queensland coast. They have a head about 4.5 in. (12cm) wide, with long trailing tentacles and are almost impossible to see in the water. They are believed to breed in estuaries, and are usually found close to the mainland coast, so they are not a problem at island resorts a fair distance from the coast or on the Great Barrier Reef.

Beaches where these stingers are prevalent usually have warning signs. During the time when the stingers occur, it is advisable to swim in the sea only where protective swimming enclosures are provided.

There is an anti venom for the box jelly fish, and it is available in the areas where they occur.

Dress for reef walking should be practical, not decorative. Thick-soled sneakers and thick socks are a wise precaution — reef creatures, not surprisingly, don't take kindly to being stood on. Coral scratches can also be a problem as they are easily infected. If you do graze or cut yourself on coral, seek medical attention. When you are exploring the Reef, be sensible. Don't put your hand into holes which you can't see into, or pick up shells unless you know what you're doing. The best policy is: admire, but don't touch.



**Dreamtime Reptile Reserve.** Childers Road. The personal guided tour takes in a variety of interesting and unique reptiles. Phone (071) 51 5730.

**Hinkler House Memorial Museum.** Mt Perry Road. Pioneer aviator Bert Hinkler, who made the first solo flight from England to Australia in 1928, was born in Bundaberg. The museum is housed in Hinkler's former home from Southampton, England. The house was dismantled and shipped to Australia and reconstructed in Bundaberg. Phone (071) 52 0222.

**Paradise Bird Park.** Paradise Lane. Native birds and animals call this tranquil bushland setting home. Many exotic varieties can also be seen. Phone (071) 55 1085.

**Pennyroyal Herb Farm.** Penny's Lane. Take the time to smell the fresh fragrances and taste the aromatic herbs in this beautifully landscaped garden. Herbal refreshments and remedies are available. Phone (071) 55 1622.

**Tropical Wines.** Mt Perry Road. Taste unusual wines made from fresh Queensland fruits at this unique winery. Phone (071) 51 5993.



### Around Bundaberg

**The Great Barrier Reef.** Bundaberg is the most southerly access point for the Reef. **Lady Elliot Island** is just a 30 minute flight away and **Lady Musgrave Island** can be reached by luxury high speed catamaran in two and a half hours. Both islands are coral atolls, turtle rookeries and bird sanctuaries.

**The beaches.** Bundaberg is only 7 miles (10km) from the coast. The main resort is **Bargara** which has patrolled surfing beaches and still-water swimming areas. **Mon Repos Environmental Park**, just north of Bargara, is Australia's largest and most accessible turtle rookery. Approximately 400 turtles come ashore to lay their eggs from November on, and hatchlings appear from mid-January to late March.

**National parks.** The Bundaberg area has several national parks. **Woodgate National Park**, on the coast south of Bundaberg, is a 13,500 acre (5,500 ha) park noted for its colorful wildflowers, and variety of native birds and animals. **Cania Gorge, Mt Walsh and Auburn River National Parks**, in the Burnett hinterland, can also be reached from Bundaberg.

**The Mystery Craters**, west of Bundaberg, are intriguing. The 35 craters were formed more than 25 million years ago, but teams of geologists have been unable to determine how. Phone (071) 77 7291.

**Nightlife:** The Bundaberg area offers varied options. Everything from going to a night club to watching turtles hatching! Because the area produces seafood, beef, tropical fruits and such a variety of vegetables the restaurants are good too. Bon appetit!

**Accommodation:** The Bundaberg area has a range of excellent accommodation, from good quality economy to international beach resort. There is a resort on Lady Elliot Island — stay in beach front units or "rough it" in style in a safari tent.

**Activities:** Almost every sport is played. Other activities include snorkeling and scuba diving on the Great Barrier Reef, fossicking at old gold and copper mines in the Burnett hinterland, bushwalking and birdwatching in the many national parks, mountaineering and bushwalking (Mt. Walsh National Park is one of the best locations in Australia), swimming and surf-

ing, horse riding. The Burnett River is ideal for canoeing, kayaking, water skiing and fishing.

**Tours:** Tours to Fraser, Lady Elliot and Lady Musgrave Islands operate from Bundaberg. Coach tours to attractions in the area operate daily, and night tours of Mon Repos turtle rookery are available November to January. Cane fire tours are also available during the cane harvesting season. Whale watching cruises operate mid-August to mid-October.

Gladstone Harbor is a beautiful natural harbor and the departure point for cruises on the harbor and to nearby islands including Heron Island. The Brisbane to Gladstone and Gladstone to Hamilton Island races are well-known events on the yachting calendar.

Gladstone's industry is on such a scale that it is an attraction in itself. Queensland Alumina Limited is the world's largest alumina plant. The lights around the harbor are spectacular at night.

Heron Island on the Great Barrier Reef north-east of Gladstone has been described as the "the ultimate reef experience". A true coral cay, Heron attracts divers from all around the world. Reef walking is popular too. The resort offers several standards of accommodation.

**Agnes Waters/1770:** In 1770, Captain James Cook discovered a picturesque deep-water inlet and from the seaward slopes viewed Agnes Water, a white sand surfing beach stretching into the distance as far as the eye can see.
