





The ancient Japanese sake ceremony called "Kagami Biraki" or "Kagami Wari" in Japanese, literally means "open mirror" or "break open mirror". Since sake was first produced over 2,000 years ago, sake has been revered and treated as sacred as it is considered spiritually refreshing. The sake is ladled to a wooden masu (cup) and given to the participants who then toast in Japanese saying, KAMPAI!!! To this day, sake is still offered and dedicated when attending a religious shrine whilst one prays for peace and prosperity.

The Kagamiwari ceremony is the ritual breaking open of a wooden Taru (sake barrel) lid with a wooden mallet. It signifies the start of a ceremony or special occasion and also a new beginning; an official opening ceremony, a new partnership, new product launch, new office opening, new business venture, wedding, engagement or special birthday celebration.



PRESENTERS

Yasumasa Nagamine, Consul General of Japan, Consulate General of Japan in San Francisco

Mr. Yasumasa Nagamine began his term as the Consul General of Japan in San Francisco in August 2007. He has previously served in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA) as Deputy Director-General at the Foreign Policy Bureau, International Legal Affairs Bureau, and the North American Affairs Bureau. In addition to serving as a Minister in the Embassies of Japan in the United Kingdom and India, Mr. Nagamine has held posts as Director of two MOFA Bureaus, as Counselor in the Office of the Prime Minister, and as First Secretary at the Embassy of Japan in Washington, D.C. He joined MOFA in 1977 and has earned diplomas from Oxford University and Tokyo University.

Takahiro Shinyo, Ph.D., Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary, Deputy Permanent Representative of Japan to the United Nations

Mr. Takahiro Shinyo has been the Ambassador of Japan to the United Nations since August of 2006. He has served in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA) as the Ambassador Director-General of the Global Issues Department and as the Consul-General in Düsseldorf, Germany. Mr. Shinyo has also been the Head of the Division for Disarmament and for UN Policy and the Deputy Director-General of the European Affairs Bureau and of the European and Oceanian Affairs Bureau. In addition to his work with the Japanese Embassies in Switzerland, China, and Germany, Mr. Shinyo has published several books and taught as a professor at Ritsumeikan University in Kyoto, Osaka University, and Tokyo University. He graduated with a law degree from Osaka University and joined the MOFA in 1972.

Masashi Komurasaki, First Secretary, Embassy of Japan

Mr. Masashi Komurasaki specializes in environmental issues at the Embassy of Japan to the United States of America. He is an expert on environmental laws, regulations, and taxes. Prior to his diplomatic appointment, his emphasis was on waste management and 3R (reduce, reuse and recycle) issues and was the project leader in the Ministry of the Environment for laws to promote recycling and waste management. He was also in charge of Japan's Green Tax for Eco-Friendly Automobiles. Mr. Komurasaki holds an MPA and an MA from the Maxwell School, Syracuse University. He holds a bachelor's degree in Law and International Relations from Hitotsubashi University in Japan.

Takeshi Miki, Director, Energy Efficiency and Conservation Division at the Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry (METI)

Mr. Takeshi Miki has been the Director of METI's Energy Efficiency and Conservation Division since 2005. After joining the Ministry in 1986, he served as the Director of the Environmental Affairs and Recycling Office of the Commerce and Information Policy Bureau. Mr. Miki has earned an MSc in International Relations from the London School of Economics and Political Science, and an MS and a BS in Physics from the University of Tokyo. His work includes research at the University of California's Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory.

Masami Hasegawa, Manager, Environment Group for Industrial Affairs Bureau III of Nippon Keidanren (Japan Business Federation)

Mr. Masami Hasegawa currently works on environmental policy issues, including global climate change, for Keidanren. He has headed Keidanren's Economic Law Group and Tax and the Economic Policy Bureau's Accounting Group, where he wrote policy recommendations on such matters as corporate law, competition policy,

taxation, and accounting standards. Within Keidanren's International Economic Affairs Department, Mr. Hasegawa specialized in North American Affairs, European Affairs, and multilateral trade and investment issues. He has also served as Senior Researcher on anti-monopoly laws in the Japanese Cabinet Office. Mr. Hasegawa earned a LL.M. with honors from Case Western Reserve University and a BA in Law from Waseda University. He has worked as a Research Associate at Harvard University's Weatherhead Center for International Affairs.

Satoshi Yamakawa, Director, Heat Pump and Thermal Storage Energy Center of Japan

Before joining the Heat Pump and Thermal Storage Energy Center of Japan, Mr. Satoshi Yamakawa worked at the Architectural Engineering Center at TEPCO and the Tokyo Electric Power Company. His area of research is Energy Efficiency in Building and Thermal Storage Technology. Mr. Yamakawa received both a bachelor's degree in Architectural Engineering and a master's degree in Environmental Engineering from Waseda University.

Masakazu Shio, Technical General Manager, Technology Department of Sekisui Chemical Co., Ltd.

Mr. Masakazu Shio became the General Manager of Sekisui Chemical's Technology Department in 2003. Since joining Sekisui Chemical in 1985, he has worked as a technical staff member of house design and as the Project Leader of Eco-Housing before assuming his current role. He graduated from the Engineering Department of Kobe University, and is a First Class Registered Architect in Japan.

David Thompson, Director, Corporate Environmental Department, Panasonic Corporation of North America

David Thompson has worked for Panasonic for 24 years. Since 1995, David has headed Panasonic's Corporate Environmental Department, where he has responsibility for environmental compliance for facilities and products, environmental marketing strategies, state and federal government policy issues and special projects. David now serves concurrently as President, Electronic Manufacturers Recycling Management Company, LLC (MRM). MRM is tasked with developing and managing electronic product recycling programs on behalf of electronic product manufacturers. David has been involved in environmental issues since 1991, when Panasonic played a key role in establishing the Portable Rechargeable Battery Association (PRBA), a trade association addressing environmental issues. David served as Chairman of both the PRBA Operating Committee and Recycling Committee until April 1994 when he was elected President and took a leave of absence from Panasonic to start up the newly formed Rechargeable Battery Recycling Corporation. RBRC is tasked with implementing and operating national collection and recycling programs for Ni-Cd batteries in both the United States and Canada.

David Crane, Special Advisor to the Governor for Jobs and Economic Growth.

Before joining the Schwarzenegger Administration, Crane was a partner for 25 years with Babcock & Brown, an investment/merchant bank that grew from five employees in one office when he joined in 1979 to more than 400 people in 18 offices around the world when he retired in 2003. Crane lives with his wife and two children in San Francisco.

PRESENTERS

Gary Dymski, founding Director of the University of California Center Sacramento (UCCS)

He came to UCCS from the University of California, Riverside, where he holds the rank of professor of economics. Gary received his B.A. in urban studies from the University of Pennsylvania in 1975, an MPA from Syracuse University in 1977, and a Ph.D. in economics from the University of Massachusetts, Amherst in 1987. Gary has written one book, co-edited six other books, and published more than 100 articles and chapters on banking, financial fragility, urban development, credit-market discrimination, the Latin American and Asian financial crises, economic exploitation, and housing finance. Since 1998, Gary has been an academic guest in Japan several times; he has given 27 seminars or conference presentations at Japanese universities. In 2000 Gary was a visiting scholar at the Center for International Research on the Japanese Economy (CIRJE) at Tokyo University.

Darren Bouton, Deputy Cabinet Secretary to the Office of the Governor appointed in 2008

Darren is responsible for implementing Governor Schwarzenegger's Energy, Environmental and Resources policy. He acts as the Governor's liaison to the California Resources Agency, the California Environmental Protection Agency, the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) and the California Independent System Operator (CAISO). Before working in the Governor's Office, Darren served as Manager of Sustainable Communities for the Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) from 2006 to 2008 and Senior Program Manager of Renewable Energy Programs at PG&E's Pacific Energy Center from 2004 to 2006. Darren also served as Manager of Green Building Services for KEMA Incorporated, Environmental Services Specialist and the Green Building Coordinator for the city of San Jose's Environmental Services Department, Policy & Planning division, and as a faculty member at San Jose State University, where he was a lecturer in the Environmental Studies Department and Program Coordinator for the Energy Concentration. Darren holds an M.S. in Environmental and Energy Policy from the University of Delaware and a B.S. in Economics from Santa Clara University.

The Honorable Senator Christine Kehoe, Chair, Senate Committee on Energy, Utilities and Communications

Christine Kehoe was elected to the State Senate on November 2, 2004 to represent the 39th Senate District. In 2006, she chaired the Senate's Local Government Committee, where she sponsored the most important redevelopment reform bill in more than a decade. Senator Kehoe is a member of the Senate Committee on Budget & Fiscal Review; Natural Resources & Water; Transportation & Housing; Local Government, the Governor's Broadband Task Force, the California Cultural and Historical Endowment; and the Sea Grant Advisory Panel. She also serves on the Select Committees on Defense and Aerospace Industry; the Natural Resources and Water's Subcommittee on Delta Resources; the Joint Committee on the Arts; and the Select Committee on Coastal Protection and Watershed Conservation.

Prior to being elected to the Senate, Kehoe served two terms as a California State Assembly Member representing the 76th District (2000-04). During her first term in the State Assembly, Kehoe distinguished herself by becoming the second woman ever to be elected Assembly Speaker pro Tempore, the Assembly's second highest-ranking position. In the State Assembly, she carried the largest energy conservation bill package in the state's history. Prior to being elected to serve California's 76th Assembly District, Kehoe served seven years as City Council Member representing San Diego's Third District. As a Council Member, Christine was at the forefront on

environmental issues, serving as chair of the Public Safety and Neighborhood Services Committee. She led efforts to improve and beautify San Diego, reduce street crime, and improve recreational opportunities for families. Before her years in elected office, Christine was an editor of a local San Diego newspaper, executive director of the Hillcrest Business Association, and a director of the AIDS Assistance Fund, among many involvements at the grass-roots level.

Andrew Altevoigt, Ph.D., Climate Change Program Manager in the Office of the Secretary of California Environmental Protection Agency

Dr. Altevoigt is responsible for assisting the Secretary in coordinating the Climate Action Team and related greenhouse gas mitigation and adaptation initiatives. His work includes coordinating climate change policy implementation across state government. Prior to arriving at Cal EPA, Dr. Altevoigt spent 15 years as an academic environmental researcher. His research experience includes, most recently, 5 years in the Civil and Environmental Engineering Department at Princeton University as part of the Carbon Mitigation Initiative. Dr. Altevoigt also has research experience in theoretical fluid dynamics, groundwater modeling and aquatic chemistry. Dr. Altevoigt has a Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Environmental Engineering from M.I.T and a Ph.D. in Hydrology from UC Davis.

Anthony Eggert, Advisor, California Air Resources Board

Anthony R. Eggert was appointed by Governor Schwarzenegger as the Science and Technology Policy Advisor of the California Air Resources Board. He provides council to the Chair of the Board Mary Nichols on the implementation of California's Global Warming Solutions Act (AB32) as well as implementation of ARB's other vehicle and transportation fuel regulations. Anthony served in several policy and technical positions including: Energy Policy Advisor to the University of California - Office of the President in Washington DC, Associate Research Director of the UC-Davis Institute of Transportation Studies Hydrogen Pathways program, and Manager of the Ford's California Fuel Cell Partnership operations. Anthony has authored and presented papers at more than 50 national and international conferences, testified before congress, and is the recipient of recognition from the Department of Energy, Department of Transportation, National Science Foundation, and the National Academies of Science. Anthony has a degree in Mechanical Engineering from University of Wisconsin Madison and a Master's in Transportation Technology and Policy from UC Davis.

Dr. William C.G. Burns, Senior Fellow Center for Global Law & Policy, Santa Clara University School of Law

Before coming to Santa Clara, he was an Associate Professor in the International Environmental Policy Program at the Monterey Institute of International Studies in Monterey, California, as well as Assistant Secretary of State for Public Affairs for the State of Wisconsin. He also serves as Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of International Wildlife Law & Policy (<http://www.jiwlw.com>), Co-Chair of the International Environmental Law Committee of the American Society of International Law, and is the incoming President of the Marine Section of the Society for Conservation Biology. His research focuses on climate change and international wildlife law, as well as operationalization of the precautionary principle in international environmental law regimes. He has published many articles and chapters, and has several edited books. Most recently, he is co-editor (with Hari Osofsky) of the forthcoming book *Adjudicating the Climate: International and National Causes of Action on Climate Change* (Cambridge University Press) and *Climate Change and the Law of Property* (Aspen 2008).

PRESENTERS

Rod Diridon, Sr., Executive Director, Mineta Transportation Institute, San Jose State University; Chair Emeritus and Member, California High Speed Rail Authority Board; and Vice Chair, High Speed and Intercity Rail Committee, American Public Transportation Association

Rod Diridon, Sr., is the executive director of the Mineta Transportation Institute, created by Congress in 1991; he was recently elected chair of the national Council of University Transportation Centers. He was raised in Dunsmuir, and received BS (accounting) and MSBA (statistics) degrees from San Jose State University. After college Rod was a naval officer with two Vietnam combat tours. He is widely recognized as one of the most influential leaders in Silicon Valley. He has spent 24 years in elective office, including the Saratoga City Council and the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors and Santa Clara County Transit Board. He chaired the latter two boards and also all three regional governmental organizations in the San Francisco Bay Area – the Bay Area Council of Governments, the Metropolitan Transportation Commission, and the Bay Area Air Quality Management District.

Rod has chaired over one hundred programs and associations, most related to transit and the environment. Among his many positions, he served as North American vice chair of the International Transit Association, and chaired a Transportation Research Board's study panel on "Combating Global Warming through Sustainable Transportation Policy." In 1976, Rod chaired the state's first successful ½-cent sales tax for transit, and chaired numerous campaigns to plan and finance. He is president and founder of the California Trolley and Railroad Corporation, and chairs the Silicon Valley-area League of Conservation Voters, among several service-leadership roles. The Amtrak/Caltrain station in San Jose has been renamed the San Jose Diridon Station in his honor.


Tracy Arnold, Director, Jobs and Economic Growth for the Office of Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger

FORUM VENUES

The Capitol Rotunda

The rotunda at once divides and unifies the Senate and the Assembly, the two houses of the California State Legislature, who occupy the South and North wings of the Capitol, respectively. The heart of the California State Capitol is the Rotunda. This circular room is 53 feet in diameter and rises 128 feet from the basement of the building to the oculus at the apex of the inner dome. On occasion, the Rotunda serves as a ceremonial space, but more frequently, the Rotunda serves as the main orientation space for the hundreds of Rotunda Cross Section visitors who explore the Capitol each day. Rotunda Flower Niche Here, while visitors snap photos and sign up for tours, legislative staffers, lawmakers, reporters, and museum employees, help carry out and document the work of state government.



Stanford Mansion

The Victorian-era Leland Stanford Mansion, serves as the State's official address for diplomatic and business receptions as well as offering public tours as a California State Historic Park. Built between 1856 and 1872, the four-story, 19,000 square foot Mansion has special historical and architectural significance. It served as the office of three governors during California's early years: Leland Stanford, Fredrick Low and Henry Haight. It was also the site of California's first presidential visit by Rutherford B. Hayes and General Sherman in 1880. The Mansion was acquired by California State Parks in 1978 and has recently undergone a major restoration. Today the Stanford Mansion is once again ready to receive California's most important guests and to provide opportunities for visitors to learn about both the home's fascinating past and its exciting future.
