Op-Ed: Our united front to support Afghanistan

On January 28, foreign ministers from around the world will fly to London for a conference on Afghanistan. This follows much preparatory work, most recently at a meeting yesterday in Abu Dhabi.

The London Conference will renew and reinvigorate the international community's support for Afghan efforts to rebuild their country. We both attended President Hamid Karzai's inauguration in November and heard him set out a clear agenda for his country. We now look to him and the Afghan government to take forward this agenda. But, without our support, the Afghan government cannot rebuild their country and confront the Taliban. So as we enter 2010, we need to ally the resources of the whole 43 nation coalition - countries like the UAE and UK - behind Afghan leadership.

The rationale for the mission in Afghanistan remains: to help the Afghans secure their country and rebuild stability after 30 years of war and strife and, as a result, ensure Afghanistan never again becomes an incubator of al Qa'eda and international terrorism. That does not mean that the international coalition will remain in Afghanistan forever. When the Afghan National Security Forces can assume responsibility for their own security, we will withdraw our troops and focus our energies on helping Afghanistan to address the many long-term challenges it faces - illiteracy, weak institutions, and corruption.

The focus of the London Conference is to mobilise efforts behind a clear plan for how to deploy military and civilian resources. To achieve this, the international effort needs to be upgraded in three key areas.

First, we need to ensure that there is security on the ground to allow development and rebuilding to accelerate. The Afghan people need to believe that when international troops leave - as they will - it will be the Afghan authorities, not the Taliban, that will prevail. So the conference will focus on how international forces can help mentor, partner and develop the Afghan National Security Forces. We are making progress. The Afghan National Security Forces are involved in 90 per cent of all military operations. But there is more to be done. In particular, we want the Afghan government to commit to providing and deploying more military and police.

As a key part of Afghans taking responsibility for their own country and challenges, coalition forces must gradually hand over - district by district and province by province - lead responsibility for security to the Afghans, as and when the conditions for doing so have been met. For those insurgents who are feeling the pressure, as ordinary Afghans turn against them and the military steps up its operations, we need a serious reintegration programme to give insurgents a route back into normal Afghan

life. We hope that at the London Conference the international community will announce its willingness generously to fund an Afghan-led reintegration programme. Our aim is not to kill every insurgent, but to win over the support of ordinary Afghans, divide the enemy, and get Afghanistan's neighbours to become part of the solution.

The second challenge facing the Afghan government, at least in certain parts of the country, is to avoid being out-governed. The Taliban have appointed shadow governors, are installing courts to deliver their brutal and arbitrary justice, and have systems to address complaints against their own so-called officials.

At a national level, the government must respond by tackling corruption and providing the Afghan people with the services they want and need. Great strides have been made with education - seven million Afghan children are now registered in schools compared with one million in 2001. But there are myriad other challenges that have to be addressed, not least the need to build up structures of local government to ensure effective and inclusive representation. President Karzai's suggestion of a loya jirga - a gathering of regional leaders and tribal chiefs - in 2010 might be an important step in the right direction. Deciding Afghanistan's internal structures is for Afghans, but the international community must stand ready to help, including through financial assistance. Winning the governance battle cannot be done on the cheap.

The third element in helping Afghanistan to stand on its own feet is a new relationship between Afghanistan and its neighbours. Terrorism, crime, drugs and migration spill over Afghanistan's borders. Yet each of the neighbouring countries could do more to stabilise Afghanistan and stem the flow of foreign funding and support to terrorists. To unlock this shift, more trust needs to be built between countries within the region. Each needs to know that the country will not return to being a chessboard upon which the geopolitical struggles of others are played out. That is why all Afghanistan's and key regional partners have been invited to the London Conference.

In 2010, we need greater unity among the international community and greater division within the insurgency. The London Conference will start by bringing together many different voices to forge a clearer and more coherent international position. But ultimately its success will depend not just on commitments and promises made on the day, but on strategies and actions pursued by individual nation states as part of a coherent international effort in support of the Afghan government over the months and years to come. For our part, the UAE and UK are determined to do what we can to support Afghanistan and its people.

Arms smuggling heightens Iran fears

U.N. BAN IS DEFIED

Tehran may be building arsenal, helping militias

SHARJAH, UNITED ARAB EMIRATES -- The warning came almost too late. The freighter ANL Australia had already fired its engines for a 70-mile dash to Iran when customs agents here were alerted to a possible hidden cache of weapons on board.

Inspectors from the United Arab Emirates quickly swarmed the ship and uncovered a truck-size container packed with small arms made in North Korea. Concealed deeper in the ship was the real find: hundreds of crates containing military hardware and a grayish, foul-smelling powder, explosive components for thousands of short-range rockets.

The nature of the cargo, seized in July and described for the first time in interviews with officials and analysts in the UAE and Washington, has raised fears that Iran is ramping up efforts to arm itself and anti-Israel militias in the Middle East. Israeli officials have warned that they may use force to prevent Iran from developing nuclear weapons.

The freighter seized in this port enclave was one of five vessels caught this year carrying large, secret caches of weapons apparently intended for the Lebanese group Hezbollah, the Palestinian organization Hamas or the Quds Force, a wing of the Iranian Revolutionary Guard Corps that supports insurgents in Iraq, according to U.S. and U.N. officials and intelligence analysts. In three cases, the contraband included North Korean- or Chinese-made components for rockets such as the 122mm Grad, which has a range of up to 25 miles and which Hamas and Hezbollah have fired into Israel.

Among the weapons components discovered aboard the ANL Australia were 2,030 detonators for 122mm rockets, as well as electric circuitry and a large quantity of solid-fuel propellant, according to an account given by UAE and U.N. Security Council officials. The materials were bought from North Korea and shipped halfway around the globe in sealed containers, labeled as oil-drilling supplies, that passed through a succession of freighters and ports.

An Israeli raid last month on a ship in the eastern Mediterranean reportedly netted hundreds more 122mm rockets. Israeli officials said the freighter was bound for Syria and was carrying 500 tons of armaments intended for Hezbollah. Similar caches were discovered this year at a port in Cyprus and aboard Russian and German cargo ships searched by U.S. Navy teams.

A U.S. intelligence official familiar with the UAE episode acknowledged that U.S. spies "played a key role" in tracking the shipment, but he declined to elaborate.

The surge in smuggling is a direct challenge to the Security Council, which is convening a special panel this month to review Iranian violations of U.N. resolutions banning such weapons shipments. U.N. and U.S. officials say sanctions adopted by the world body against Iran appear to be having little effect, and Iranian leaders continue to defend their right to aid groups they call "fighters in the path of God."

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"We are proud to defend Hamas and Hezbollah," Ali Larijani, Iran's parliament speaker, said at a news conference in May. "We are not trying to hide it."

High-seas shell game

The route chosen by North Korea to deliver the rocket components eventually seized by the UAE was hard to track. According to shipping records, the 10 large cargo containers left the North Korean port of Nampo on May 30 on a North Korean vessel, and two days later they were transferred to a Chinese ship in the port city of Dalian, in northern China.

From there, the containers were ferried to Shanghai, where on June 13 they were moved to a third ship, the ANL Australia, a Bahamian-flagged freighter owned by a French consortium. Spokesmen for the freighter's owner and operator say they received sealed cargo containers along with manifests that listed the contents as oil-well equipment.

By mid-June, the cargo had left Shanghai on the ANL Australia, which followed a meandering course through East and Southeast Asia, pausing in mid-July in Dubai, one of the world's largest seaports. Then it left on the final leg of its journey, to Shahid Rajai, on the shores of Iran's Strait of Hormuz.

Because of international sanctions, Iran and North Korea have been forced to buy and sell military-related technology through clandestine means. Iran, in particular, has favored a strategy of redundant purchases from multiple vendors, assuming that some shipments will be discovered and stopped, said David Albright, a former U.N. nuclear inspector who is president of the Institute for Science and International Security, a nonprofit research group in Washington. Using such schemes, and employing a network of front companies, Iran has managed to obtain key technology and equipment for advanced missiles as well as a sophisticated nuclear program.

"These networks have spread like the Internet, and as they get bigger, they get even harder to destroy," Albright said. "They use fronts to obtain all kinds of technology from major suppliers, including Europe, Russia, China and the United States."

Gulf states crack down

For years, Dubai served as a convenient hub for Iran's illicit procurement network. But two years ago, the UAE began what U.S. officials acknowledge is a serious crackdown on Iranian trafficking in military technology. Its government has enacted tough export controls, restricted the number of business visas to Iranians and closed numerous suspected front companies, according to UAE officials as well as Western intelligence officers and independent analysts.

But government officials and analysts acknowledged that the UAE's capacity to shut down trafficking is still being developed, and much of the illegal trade in the region consists of cash-and-carry transactions that are harder to detect and control.

The crackdown also is not without costs. The UAE, which conducts nearly \$15 billion in annual trade with Iran, has received numerous complaints over what Tehran calls unwarranted interference by UAE regulators.

Yet, UAE officials insist that they are acting in their own interest, and not in response to pressure from the United States or anyone else.

"No one can tell us that we can't have legitimate trade," one UAE official said. "But we were coming into a crunch, where we had to make a choice for the sake of national security: We either have to do a better job of stopping this trafficking or prepare to live with a nuclear Iran."

UAE officials faced that dilemma July 22 when alerted to possible contraband in the ship bound for Iran, the official said.

After the containers holding the arms and rocket materials were removed, the ANL Australia was released to continue its journey. The propellant was left on UAE soil, where it remained as recently as this week. The U.N. sanctions committee has filed a formal query with North Korea, but there has been no response.

UAE officials say they are awaiting the arrival of U.N. witnesses to begin the process of destroying the fuel.

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Executive Summary

This policy statement outlines the approach of the UAE Government towards the provision of direct support to the people of Afghanistan. It explains the rationale behind the direct involvement of UAE humanitarian and military personnel, and identifies the key activities these representatives are engaged in to support the development of healthcare, education and basic community infrastructure for the people of Afghanistan, in an environment of safety and stability.

It analyses the key areas of humanitarian need in Afghanistan and underlines the responsibility of the international community to respond to the significant healthcare, education and community infrastructure challenges that the people of Afghanistan continue to face. Importantly, this policy articulates the opinion of the UAE Government that safety and stability are essential prerequisites for the successful provision of comprehensive humanitarian aid and the development of sustainable community infrastructure.

The Situation in Afghanistan

According to leading international organizations, and other members of the international community, large parts of Afghanistan are in a situation of extreme humanitarian need and continue to live under the threat of instability and the violent activities of criminal and insurgent forces. Despite the significant efforts made by the international community, including the UAE, over the last five years, the provision of quality healthcare, education and basic community infrastructure continue to be three of the greatest areas of need in Afghanistan.

According to UNICEF, an estimated 22 million Afghans, representing 70 percent of the population, live in poverty and substandard conditions.¹ It is estimated that 54 percent of Afghan children are suffering from severe or moderate stunting and 39 percent are severely or moderately underweight.² Similarly, 7 percent of Afghan children suffer from acute malnutrition and 54 percent are chronically malnourished.³

Infant mortality is also an ongoing concern, as it is estimated that twenty five percent of children in Afghanistan will die before their fifth birthday.⁴ It is also estimated that more than 50 women die every day from complications in pregnancy and childbirth.⁵

The lack of basic hygiene and sanitation facilities is a major contributor to the current health situation. For example, it was estimated in January 2008 that only 23 percent of the entire population of Afghanistan has access to safe drinking water, while access to sanitation facilities is as low as 12 percent.⁶

For social and demographic reasons, education is also an immediate priority. According to UNICEF, Afghanistan has a relatively young population, with more than half of the local population less than 18 years of age.⁷ Presently, it is estimated that two million primary school-aged children (sixty percent) are not in school, with more than half of this group being girls.⁸ Ensuring the country's children and young adults are educated is an ongoing challenge for organizations on the ground.

This is a critical area of need, as the literacy rate for young women (15-24 years of age) in Afghanistan is only 18 percent, and among males of the same age group it is only 51 percent.⁹ The implications of this trend being allowed to continue into the future are dramatic.

However, addressing this need is particularly challenging, as according to UNICEF, schools are often attacked by warring factions in Afghanistan. In the first half of 2007 for example, there were thirty one separate attacks on schools recorded, dominated by the torching of school facilities and explosions.¹⁰ There were also attacks and threats made against students and teachers across Afghanistan.¹¹ In certain parts of Afghanistan, children are studying in tents as organizations such as UNICEF and its international partners work to create a permanent school structure for the local community.

One of the major challenges is encouraging and making it possible for school-aged children to enroll in education, despite the many additional responsibilities they are faced with at such an early age. In the current social and economic environment in Afghanistan, many school-aged children are working to support their families, meaning education is not always considered an immediate priority. This underscores the need for broader community development in Afghanistan, alongside the development of schools and educational services.

It is also important to recognize that in a Muslim country such as Afghanistan, broader community development generally involves the provision of mosques, prayer facilities and other materials associated with the practicing of Islamic faith.

From the perspective of the UAE, the international community has a responsibility to address these pressing humanitarian needs, in healthcare, education and the provision of basic infrastructure. As a responsible member of the international community, with natural insights into the broader cultural needs of the people of Afghanistan, the UAE is compelled to contribute to this international response.

UAE Contributions

The UAE continues to make a significant humanitarian contribution in Afghanistan, and has done so since 2003. Through organizations such as the Red Crescent, the generous donations made by UAE citizens and volunteers have contributed to the construction of:

- 11 schools educating 300 students per day;
- 6 medical clinics which have treated 35,000 Afghani patients;
- Zayed University, Afghanistan, serving over 6,400 students per year;
- a major hospital with an annual capacity of 7,000 patients;
- 38 mosques each providing a prayer service for over 300 people;
- a general public library serving more than 400 students and visitors per day;
- accommodation in Zayed City for 200 displaced families;
- 160 wells providing healthy drinking water.

Privately, the UAE people have contributed US\$22 million for food, medicine and basic relief projects providing housing and shelter in Afghanistan. In addition, the UAE Red Crescent has invested US\$19 million in local projects, and the UAE Government has dedicated US\$30 million to international reconstruction efforts in the country.

Evidence of Progress

So far, international organizations such as UNICEF and its partners have:

- Immunized over five million children against polio and delivered millions of vitamin A supplements;
- Provided access to safe water and sanitary facilities for over 500,000 Afghans;
- Provided five new salt iodization plants to reduce iodine deficiency;
- Established therapeutic feeding programs in 20 hospitals to address malnutrition;
- Trained 30,000 teachers and supplied educational materials for 4.87 million students.¹²

School enrolments are also increasing. Assisted by the work of international organizations and members of the international community, over 6 million students attended the first day of the school year in Afghanistan in March 2008.¹³ This included approximately 800,000 children who have been enrolled in school for the first time.¹⁴ It is also estimated that over 90,000 women across Afghanistan will be encouraged to learn how to read and write for the first time through 3,500 literacy centres that have been established by UNICEF and its partner organizations.¹⁵

UAE organizations have also established community-based schools in a number of provinces that are making an invaluable contribution to the future of Afghanistan's children, and the development of literacy and basic skills.

4 | UAE Policy for the Provision of Direct Support to Afghanistan

The Need for a Military Support Presence

Humanitarian projects in healthcare, education and the provision of basic infrastructure are regularly threatened by violence and instability in Afghanistan. Criminal and insurgent forces continue to threaten the safety and stability of local communities, and regularly seek to undermine the success of humanitarian and community development initiatives being delivered by international organizations.

As a result, it has been necessary for the UAE to maintain a military support presence in effected provinces to protect the personnel of humanitarian organizations and to provide the stability necessary for humanitarian projects to succeed. It is the opinion of the UAE that humanitarian projects in healthcare, education and the provision of basic infrastructure cannot succeed, as they should, in an environment of ongoing instability.

From the perspective of the UAE, the presence of its military personnel in Afghanistan is therefore necessary to contribute to the establishment of an environment of safety and stability, in order to allow the many humanitarian projects underway in that country to succeed.

The Responsibilities of the UAE Armed Forces in Afghanistan

In accordance with the UAE Constitution, the UAE's Armed Forces can, and will, only be used for defensive purposes. The work of the UAE Armed Forces in Afghanistan is guided by this principle, and personnel are focused on the protection of humanitarian initiatives and the provision of safety and stability for local communities. Through its work in Afghanistan, the UAE seeks to extend the protections it offers its own citizens at home, in the area of national security, to the citizens of Afghanistan during its current period of need.

The UAE Armed Forces are also directly involved in culturally-sensitive community development activities, alongside representatives of key humanitarian organizations such as the Red Crescent. The language skills and cultural awareness of UAE Armed Forces personnel represent a significant advantage in the delivery of effective community development initiatives in a Muslim country such as Afghanistan. The construction of mosques and provision of observance materials by UAE Armed Forces personnel, for example, meets a specific cultural need of the local community and is considered to be an essential element of successful community development in many parts of Afghanistan.

The Government of the UAE is proud of the important work its humanitarian and Armed Forces personnel have been conducting in Afghanistan since 2003. Despite the ongoing need, recent achievements in healthcare, education and the provision of basic infrastructure can in part be directly and indirectly attributed to the work of the UAE Armed Forces in the provision of safety, stability and culturally-sensitive community development.

Texas' exports to the UAE are important to key sectors, companies, and regions of the State.

- Drilling Equipment** – The UAE accounted for \$1.5 billion or 29.0% of Texas's total exports of drilling equipment to all export markets during 2006-08. Companies exporting to the UAE include **Smith International, Hensley, Exxon Mobile, Conoco Phillips, Shell Petroleum, Schlumberger, Halliburton, Baker Hughes,** and **National Oilwell Varco** most with HQs in Houston but with locations throughout Texas.
- Aerospace** – The UAE accounted for \$1.2 billion or 21.9% of Texas' total exports of airplanes and aerospace parts during 2006-08. Companies exporting to the UAE include **Lockheed Martin** which produces F-16s in Ft. Worth and **Sino Swearingen Aircraft Corp.**, which is headquartered in San Antonio and now 80% owned by UAE based **Emivest**.
- Platforms** – The UAE accounted for \$414 million or 47.0% of Texas' total exports of drilling production platforms during 2006-08. Companies exporting to the UAE include **McDermott** and **Rowan** both based in Houston.
- Automotive** – The UAE accounted for \$331 million or 5.0% of Texas' exports of passenger vehicles to all export markets from 2006-08. Companies exporting to the UAE include **GM** which produces the Cadillac Escalade, Chevrolet Suburban and Tahoe, and GMC Yukon in Arlington and **Toyota** which produces the Tundra in its San Antonio plant.

Employment

Exports of goods and services, port activity supporting bilateral trade, and inward capital investment from the UAE all benefit employment. The positive employment effects attributable to Texas' exports of manufactured goods to the UAE are the easiest to calculate and the table below summarizes estimated job gains over the 2006 through 2008 period. Direct employment refers to manufacturing jobs at exporters. Indirect employment quantifies the estimated job gains in ancillary sectors such as transportation and input suppliers. Induced employment reflects jobs that are generated by the additional spending of earnings resulting from exports. Most of this spending occurs in sectors, such as restaurants and retail, that are unrelated to the exporting sector.

Partnerships

- Susan G. Komen for the Cure, in collaboration with the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Cancer Center and the US State Department's Middle East Partnership Initiative, is developing programs with UAE women's groups, government officials, physicians and medical organizations to raise awareness of breast cancer, and facilitate more effective outcomes in prevention and treatment.
- Methodist International, a subsidiary of The Methodist Hospital in Houston, signed an unprecedented agreement with Emaar Healthcare Group, the healthcare subsidiary of Emaar Properties, to build, operate and manage its health care centers throughout the Middle East, North Africa and Turkey.
- Perot Systems Corporation completed the successful roll-out of a Hospital Information System in multiple hospitals and Primary Healthcare Centres in Abu Dhabi.

Texas – Congressional Districts Associated with Top Exports to the UAE

Texas produces a wide range of manufactured goods and its production of the major items exported to the UAE is concentrated in three distinct regions: Houston and the southeast coast, Dallas/Ft. Worth, and San Antonio.

- The Houston and coastal area contain the largest concentration of industry, particularly of major suppliers of oilfield drilling equipment such as **Halliburton, Schlumberger, Baker Hughes, and Smith International**, as well as steel pipe and tube producers **Maverick Tube and CMC**. The area also contains a high concentration of refineries and petrochemical plants operated by companies such as **Exxon Mobil, Conoco Phillips, Shell, Eastman, and Celanese**.
- The major items exported to the UAE from the Dallas/Ft. Worth region include mining/drilling equipment produced by **Hensley Industries**, and cars and trucks produced at the **General Motors** plant in Arlington. Aircraft constituted the second largest export from Texas to the UAE over the 2006-08 period. Aircraft exports consisted primarily of F-16 jets produced by **Lockheed Martin** at its Ft. Worth facility but those exports peaked at more than \$800 million of deliveries in 2006 and were zero in 2008 and the first half of 2009.
- **Toyota** was the major exporter to the UAE from the San Antonio area. **Emivest Aerospace Corp.**, a subsidiary of Emirates Investment & Development, has its headquarters at the San Antonio airport. **Emivest** produces the SJ30 business jet at its West Virginia plant.
- The first table below highlights the export trends for the top three product categories exported from Texas to the UAE from 1999 through June 2009. The three subsequent tables identify the congressional districts for the main exporting companies located in each region.

A sober approach to sanctioning Iran

The cynical (and usually correct) critique of economic sanctions was summed up this way by a retired U.S. diplomat named Douglas Paal: "Sanctions always accomplish their principal objective, which is to make those who impose them feel good." The Obama administration is struggling to craft a new round of U.N. sanctions against Iran that achieves more than this feel-good impact. The ambitious goal is "to cut off the revenues that fund Iran's nuclear and missile programs," says a senior administration official.

"We are going to put as tight a squeeze on Iran as we possibly can," adds a diplomat from one of the members of the U.S.-led coalition that is beginning to discuss a new sanctions resolution at the U.N Security Council. The resolution will target the Iranian Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) and its vast network of companies, which the United States estimates may include up to one-third of Iran's total economy.

One focus of the proposed sanctions may be the Islamic Republic of Iran Shipping Lines, a 115-vessel fleet that analysts believe has carried cargo for the country's nuclear program. Another target might be the IRGC-owned construction company Khatam al-Anbiya, and its network of subsidiaries, which are said to build some of Iran's strategic infrastructure.

To provide economic muscle for the push against Iran, the Obama administration is working closely with Gulf oil exporters, such as Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates. Secretary of State Hillary Clinton visited Saudi Arabia last month to enlist its help in the sanctions campaign - and, in particular, to lobby China to back the U.N. sanctions resolution.

China is vulnerable to Iranian oil pressure because it imports about 540,000 barrels per day from Iran. So the Saudis and Emiratis have been assuring Beijing that they would be prepared to offset any shortfall in Iranian crude shipments.

The UAE has already boosted its oil exports to China as part of this pressure campaign. Shipments have increased from about 50,000 barrels per day last year to 120,000 now, with a goal by year-end of up to 200,000 barrels. Over the next few years, the UAE is offering to increase that export volume to China to about 500,000 barrels per day, which would nearly equal the current Iranian total.

Prince Saud al-Faisal, the Saudi foreign minister, traveled to China late last week to enlist its support against Iran. The Saudi message to Beijing, according to one U.S. official, is: "If you don't help us against Iran, you will see a less stable and dependable Middle East." Meanwhile, a

high-level Israeli group also visited China last weekend, according to the Financial Times. The delegation included Stanley Fischer, the governor of Israel's central bank. Fischer, an eminent economist who is respected by Chinese officials, would be able to explain the impact of the planned sanctions regime.

The Israeli visit led one prominent energy expert to speculate privately that if sanctions fail to alter Iranian behavior, the Israelis might use military means to halt Iran's oil exports.

The campaign against Iran was the central topic during a recent visit to Washington by the UAE's foreign minister, Sheik Abdullah bin Zayed al-Nahyan. He urged administration officials to include Iran's vulnerable neighbors in the Gulf Cooperation Council -- Saudi Arabia, Qatar, Oman and others -- in their planning for dealing with Iran. "We will find ways to do more with them," said the senior administration official.

The trick for the Obama administration is to craft a sanctions plan that hurts the Iranian government without causing too much pain for the Iranian people. That's one reason the administration is wary of a congressional proposal for sanctions against Iran's imports of refined petroleum products -- a step that would probably harm the public more than the regime.

Officials talk about "targeted" sanctions that focus on the Revolutionary Guard Corps and its military-industrial complex of companies. But this effort is the diplomatic equivalent of "precision bombing" -- in practice, some collateral damage is inevitable, which could help President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad rally support for his hard-line government.

What's certain is that the Iranian nuclear issue is heading into a more intense phase of confrontation -- starting with the push for tougher U.N. sanctions. The Gulf countries have been asking what the administration plans to do if the sanctions don't work: That's the big foreign policy question of 2010, and Washington is beginning now to think about the answer.
