Formation of the US-Egyptian Parliamentary Alliance

Background:

A growing number of members of Congress have had the opportunity to become more familiar with the many ways in which Egypt is an essential ally, not only in the Middle East, but throughout the world.

At the same time, members of the Egyptian Parliament are likewise becoming more interested in increasing cooperation and achieving a substantive exchange with their US counterparts on issues of mutual interest and concern.

This concept paper seeks to incorporate a number of ideas expressed by parliamentarians and their staffs in both countries on how the creation of an ongoing dialogue between the two bodies could become a reality.

Organizational Framework:

There are a number of organizations through which parliamentarians from different countries work together. For the US Congress, perhaps the most notable examples are with Mexico, Canada and Japan.

These partnerships are government-funded. They are well-staffed and a great deal of work appears to go into preparing exchanges between the parliamentarians and reporting on the outcomes of those conversations and deliberations.

What is contemplated here -- for the US and Egyptian parliamentary bodies -- is something far less formal and costly.

The alliance will begin with two meetings a year, one in each country. Members of each parliamentary body who commit to joining this alliance essentially commit to those two meetings. There will be other opportunities throughout the year to exchange views, via email and phone conversations and even on trips arranged by the parliamentarians themselves. But the basic commitment is for those two meetings.

Members and Issues Purview:

The initial goal is to involve members from both bodies who (1) have gained some seniority, experience and prominence, and (2) are working in issue areas of mutual concern to their counterpart(s) in the other body.

On the US side, the goal is to have as founding members those who preferably chair full or subcommittees.

The Moffett Group provides representation to the Government of the Arab Republic of Egypt. More information is available at the Department of Justice, Washington, DC.

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In addition to the obvious jurisdictions – Foreign Affairs or Appropriations for Foreign Operations -- the goal is to recruit, from both bodies, members whose focus is on defense, homeland security, agriculture, energy and climate-related committees.

Both US and Egyptian parliamentarians have also expressed an interest in involving private sector priorities from their constituencies in an effort to explore opportunities for expanding trade and investment in both countries.

Budget and Funding:

Ideally, foundations or other non-profit organizations, which meet guidelines written by House Ethics Committee, will appropriate funds for travel expenses.

Conversations are ongoing with such organizations and it is expected that several potential funders will be identified soon.

I am doing some work with former Rep. Toby Moffett and the Moffett Group, who asked that I forward along to you the note below:

Though we are still in the planning stages, we are working to create a US-Egyptian interparliamentary group comprised of prominent legislators from both nations. Based on our close work in the past with Rep. Wu and on his unique perspective and expertise on matters of science and technology, we immediately thought that Rep. Wu could play a significant role in this group.

The group will be composed of a small number of members from both the U.S. and Egyptian sides, and will only include members -- like your boss -- with seniority and influence, and mostly subcommittee chairs.

The Speaker of the Egyptian Parliament will be in Washington on November 4th. He will be meeting with Speaker Pelosi, but we are also trying to arrange a separate meeting with potential members of the interparliamentary group to discuss issues of interest, as well as how the group might be structured.
