

AGREEMENT FOR ADVISORY SERVICES

This Agreement is made by and between the Office of Commercial Affairs of the Royal Thai Embassy, Washington, D.C. represented by its duly authorized officials (hereinafter called "the client"), and Global Communicators, having an office at 1875 I Street, NW, Suite 500, Washington, DC 20005(hereinafter called "the Firm"). All matters related to the Agreement and payments provided hereunder should be directed to the Firm's business office at 1215 North Nash Street, Arlington, Virginia 22209.

WHEREAS, in consideration of the services hereinafter stated, the client is willing to hire the Firm to advise the client with respect to its need for general advice regarding public relations & communication issues and the Firm is willing to render such services to the client:

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

Article 1. Service of this Agreement

The purpose of this Agreement is to make available to the client advisory services (hereinafter called "the Services") by the Firm as shown in Appendix A (per the attached Scope of Work and Timeline Calendar).

The Firm agrees to render the Services as detailed in Appendix A (per the attached Scope of Work and Timeline Calendar).

Article 2. Duration

This Agreement, upon the execution of the same by all parties, will take effect March 22, 2011 and will expire September 30, 2011.

Article 3. Fees and Expenses

3.1 The client shall pay the Firm its fees and reimburse its expenses for the services rendered under this Agreement in the total amount of US\$50,000 for the services rendered under this Agreement in 3 payments (upon contract signing US\$20,000, June 1, 2011 US\$20,000 and September 30, 2011 US\$10,000, upon the project conclusion).

3.2 Taxes, which may be incurred by the Firm on payments made by the client for services rendered under this Agreement, shall be the responsibility of the client for taxes incurred in Thailand and the responsibility of the Firm for taxes incurred outside Thailand.

Article 4. Method of Payment

4.1 The fees and expenses shall be billed by invoice to the client by the Firm on a fixed schedule as described above.

Article 5. Termination

5.1 Should either party default in the execution of its obligations under this Agreement, the other party shall give the defaulting party notice in writing to remedy such default promptly.

5.2 Failure of the defaulting party in taking corrective measures as required by the other party within 15 (fifteen) days of receipt of such notice shall constitute a sufficient cause for the other party to terminate this Agreement.

5.3 In the event of termination of this Agreement due to the fault of the client, the client shall compensate the Firm for its fees and expenses incurred for the services performed up to the date of termination in connection with the termination of the Agreement.

5.4 In the event of termination of this Agreement due to the fault of the Firm, the Firm agrees to pay the client a penalty in the amount of ten per cent (10%) of the total contract amount as per stated in Article 3 section 3.1 of the Agreement.

5.5 This Agreement may be terminated by convenience of the client, at any time, by sending notice to the Firm not less than 30 (thirty) days in advance. The Firm shall be entitled to remuneration up to the date of termination.

5.6 This Agreement may be terminated by the Firm if for any professional or ethical reasons or other reasons beyond control that the Firm cannot proceed with the representation. The Firm shall be entitled to remuneration up to the date of termination.


Article 6. The Rights and Duties of the Firm

**Scope of Work
OCA Communications Plan
March-September 2011**

“Thailand...Strategic Partner to the U.S.”

In 2010, the Thai Office of Commercial Affairs (OCA) took important steps in advancing understanding of key trade issues by U.S. policymakers in Congress and the Administration.

In 2011, the effort will continue with an overarching theme that emphasizes how America benefits from trade with Thailand. Balance of trade statistics, with specific examples customized to specific states and congressional districts, will demonstrate the scope and importance of Thai trade with the United States.

Such analytical data will be used strategically to target specific Members of the House and Senate who serve on congressional committees of importance to Thailand as a means for generating ongoing relationship-building in Washington.

With historic changes in the political make-up of the U.S. Congress as a result of the November 2010 midterm elections, such efforts are crucial.

With this general theme in mind, Global Communicators will apply the tag line, “Thailand...Strategic Partner to the U.S.” that articulates the benefit American companies and employees receive from trade with Thailand, at the grassroots levels and nationally.

Little known “Factoids” such as Thailand’s role as the top importer of soybeans, sugar, cotton and Alaska salmon will appeal to state and regional constituent interests and economic impact.

New agreements such as the increase in Thai imports of seed potatoes from 14 states in America will be communicated fully through the e-newsletter and other means. At the end of this program, U.S. policymakers will have a much clearer idea of the importance of the Thai strategic partnership when it comes to trade.



1. Congressional Analysis and Targeting -- Global Communicators will review and analyze newly elected and returning Members of the House and Senate who comprise congressional committees and subcommittees of importance to Thailand and OCA. These include:

- House Ways and Means Committee
Subcommittee on Trade
- Senate Finance Committee
Subcommittee on International Trade, Customs, and Global Competitiveness
- House Foreign Affairs Committee
Subcommittee on Asia and the Pacific
Subcommittee on Terrorism, Nonproliferation and Trade
- Senate Foreign Relations Committee
Subcommittee on Near Eastern and South and Central Asian Affairs
Subcommittee on East Asian and Pacific Affairs
Subcommittee on International Development and Foreign Assistance, Economic Affairs and International Environmental Protection
- Other relevant congressional entities.

(Please reference the specific list in the Appendix.)

We will prepare a profile on each Member and a brief on pertinent facts about the Members as they may apply to Thai interests. The brief will also list senior staff with responsibilities relevant to Thai issues. The analysis will include trade data by state and, where available, by congressional district. This strategic analysis will provide specific targeting in an effort to enhance understanding of and attention to Thai trade for each individual Member of Congress and his/her constituents.

Deliverables: Dossiers presented in a loose-leaf binder, with periodic updates and changes as additions occur, provided and distributed to OCA team. GC will adapt OCA's congressional district database that overlays imports of Thai products to specific states and congressional districts.

2. Two Briefings for New Congressional Members and Staff -- Global Communicators will organize two briefings, one on the House side and one on the Senate side, with targeted participation by 20-30 senior staff of relevant Representatives and Senators (*See appendix for names and titles, when known*). The briefings will be scheduled in April, taking into account the congressional schedule and the Thai Embassy calendar (*See timetable for recommendations*).

Purpose will be to introduce Thailand key policy issues to new staff and brief all participants on the importance of U.S. trade with Thailand to the people of America. We will prepare a PowerPoint program that introduces the senior staff to Thailand and current issues of importance to the targeted congressional committees.

Deliverables -- Identify invitees, prepare an invitation, confirm congressional meeting rooms, organize the program, work with OCA officials who will present the program, draft remarks, design the PowerPoint, coach presenters, and handle all logistics, including food and beverages.

3. **Two Thai Congressional Receptions** – We will organize and implement two high-level Congressional Receptions of 30-50 Senators and senior staff and another for 30-50 Representatives and senior staff. The receptions will be held in May, taking into account the congressional schedule and the Thai calendar. Purpose will be to bring together in a more informal, social setting Members of Congress and senior staff who have an interest in Thailand, thus furthering the relationships and involvement of the policymakers.

Deliverables – Set dates, reserve rooms, and prepare invitation lists and graphics for invitation; handle all logistics including food and beverages, flowers, room layout, decorations (posters), and audio-visual equipment; work with OCA in preparing program, drafting remarks, coaching participants, and preparing and producing information packages for each guest.

4. **Intellectual Property -- Think Evolution not Revolution**

Regardless of the outcome of USTR's Special 301 'Out-of-Cycle' Review, it will remain important for Thailand to continue engaging key stakeholders on this critical issue. As the representative from USTR commented at the end of the highly successful IP Roundtable at AEI in December, "We are pleased to see that Thailand wants to see itself removed from the Priority Watch List, but also pleased that Thailand wants to improve IP protection because they view that as a positive end itself."

As discussed in early January 2011 with Minister Kessiri, it is likely necessary that the message coming from the Thai government on IP protection needs to be slightly modified and refined given that several pieces of IP legislation are not moving as quickly through the governmental agencies as once anticipated. It is critical to continue engaging key stakeholders and keep them fully informed of developments on the issue. Many stakeholders at the AEI event commented, for example, that they greatly appreciated the RTG's willingness to engage in transparent and open dialogue. They also understood that IP protection is an *evolutionary* not a *revolutionary* process (recall discussion of Israel).

While some may be disappointed about the slow pace of the legislative process, it is important to continue reinforcing the positive developments and stay engaged. In particular, as discussed on February 17, 2011, we can highlight Thailand's efforts to develop a 'creative economy' and develop domestic stakeholders interested in IP protection. As stated at the meeting, in many ways IP protection and the creative economy can be 'two sides of the same coin.

Deliverables: Building on the AEI event and moving forward, we propose to refine the message emphasizing not only enforcement activities, but also Thailand's burgeoning creative economy which is developing a powerful group inside the country that will promote IP protection over the long-term. In addition, we propose to develop a comprehensive PR campaign targeting key stakeholders to be deployed after both the OCR results and the annual report, respectively, are released. We also propose to coordinate with AEI in early summer to host another IP Roundtable event. This will be two months after the release of the annual report, and six months roughly after the highly successful first event. Every participant surveyed indicated they would welcome continuation of this type of in-depth discussion. In particular, as noted above, we want to help integrate officials from Bangkok into the event as appropriate. In addition to updating the Fact Sheets, we anticipate IP issues figuring prominently in future e-newsletters.

5. "Thai Update" E-Newsletter – A Thread Woven Throughout the Plan — and Other Communications Tools

During the 2010 program, the periodic e-newsletter has served the important purpose of drawing together components of the campaign by informing target policy makers and opinion leaders of persuasive facts and actions strategically linked to major pillars of the Thai OCA issue priorities. The tactic is a proven tool for building a cohesive and consistent communications framework.

In 2011, key members of the Obama Administration will be added to the distribution list based on their interest in Thai issues. Among those added will be:

Additionally, state governors offer opportunities for communicating key Thai messages, as demonstrated to OCA when they attended an event organized by the Washington International Trade Association in which state governors participated. GC will evaluate and recommend specific governors for special communications on the public policy issues.

The series of current OCA Fact Sheets will be reviewed, amended and expanded as the issue base changes in 2011. New Fact Sheets that focus on state and regional Thai trade impact will be prepared for customized use in communicating with Members of Congress and governors.

An OCA Information Folder again will be instrumental in providing background information written for policy makers and influencers.

Added attention will be given to using the OCA Web site and other social media tools in the communications strategy.

6. Strategic Advice and Counsel

Global Communicators policy and communications experts will provide ongoing advice and counsel to OCA throughout the seven-month period.

As always, we will be available 24/7 to provide our expertise on and understanding of the U.S. government and political process as a means of supporting the important work of OCA in Washington, DC.

Visits by Thai officials who come to Washington over the next seven months to present congressional testimony or regulatory input may offer special opportunities to communicate the Thai government's messages. We will be available to advise and counsel on how OCA might leverage such visits from Bangkok.

Additionally, we will be pleased to provide counsel on use of the new OCA Web site to maximize its effectiveness as a communications tool.

As directed by OCA, the GC team will meet with consultants retained by OCA where there is an overlapping affinity of interest in our assignments.
