(HARARE) The Movement for Democratic Change (MDC) calls upon the Southern African Development Community (SADC), the African Union (AU) and the United Nations (UN), as guarantors of the Global Political Agreement (GPA), to rein in Zanu PF and Robert Mugabe and ensure that the Joint Monitoring and Implementation Committee (JOMIC) continues to play its important role of monitoring the political process in Zimbabwe until a legitimate government is elected.

The MDC noted with great concern the decision yesterday by Zanu PF to pull out of JOMIC, a body that was created by the GPA to monitor the implementation of key political processes by the inclusive government.

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Despite some challenges, JOMIC has been playing an important role in the receiving of reports and complaints in respect to issues related to the implementation, enforcement and execution of the GPA. The relative peace and tranquility that Zimbabweans have enjoyed in the last few years can be much attributed to JOMIC's work and the policies of the MDC.

SADC, which is also playing an important mediation role in Zimbabwe, has acknowledged the important work that JOMIC is doing and has called for the strengthening of JOMIC's capacity. JOMIC has a strategic plan to monitor the coming elections to ensure that they are free and fair.

The real reason why Zanu PF is pulling out of JOMIC is that it wants a chaotic election as it fears losing in a credible one. It is very clear that Zanu PF's withdrawal is part of a "chaos faction" ploy to disengage from all platforms of negotiation with the MDC as a precursor to intensified violence and intimidation.

Contrary to claims by Zanu PF and Mugabe, the MDC has not petitioned the African Union (AU) to convene a summit on Zimbabwean elections.

In spite of all this, the MDC is aware that the people of Zimbabwe are committed to a peaceful election that produces a government of their choice. They have persevered in the face of oppression and repression by Zanu PF and come July 31 they will get their moment of a peaceful revenge through the ballot box.

President Morgan Tsvangirai's Statement on Elections, Harvest House, 1 August 2013:

This election has been a huge farce. It's credibility has been marred by administrative and legal violations which affect the legitimacy of its outcome.

There are two critical issues:

1. The election does not meet SADC Guidelines. It is a sham election that does not reflect the will of the people.

1.1 Voters' Roll

- Thousands failed to register and were disenfranchised
- Not delivered in a timely manner as required by law
- No proper inspection of the voters' roll to verify authenticity
- Duplication of names on the voters' roll
- Unauthorized movement of voters from their wards (leading to almost 40 percent of voters begin turned away and disenfranchised)

1.2 Manipulation of voters' choice—Voters forced to plead illiteracy and resort to "assistance".

1.3 Use of traditional leaders (chiefs and headman) to intimidate voters.

1.4 Unauthorized voter migration—Voters bussed into constituencies to vote, e.g. Harare South, Epworth.

1.5 Unaccounted for voters—especially in farming areas.

1.6 Abuse of the facility to use Voter Registration Slips as proof of registration.

1.7 Militarization of the electoral process—electoral processes under the effective control of security personnel.

1.8 Lack of transparency in the printing of ballots

- a.) non-compliance with section 51 of the Electoral Act.
- b.) over-printing of ballots (by more than 35 percent) and lack of accountability for ballots.

1.9 Lack of transparency and double-voting in the use of the Special Vote.

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1.10 Lack of transparency in the use of the Postal Voting System.

2. Failure to implement reforms as dictated by the GPA and SADC.

I have met with the chair of the AU observer mission, former Nigerian President Obasanjo, head of the SADC observer mission, Minister Mmembe and I have given a diplomatic briefing. The message we have given is that this is not a credible election. It does not reflect the will of the people of Zimbabwe.

For the above reasons, the election has been heavily manipulated. In our view, the outcome of this election is illegitimate. But more importantly, the shoddy manner in which it has been conducted and the consequent illegitimacy of the result will plunge this country into a serious crisis.

We therefore call for SADC and the AU audit teams to look into this process, in particular the voters' roll, the ballots and the manner in which the whole process was conducted.

In our view this election does not meet the SADC, AU and international standards for a credible, legitimate, free and fair election.

MDC Statement on Today's Constitutional Court Ruling on the Harmonized elections:

The MDC has been advised that the Constitutional Court has dismissed the application for postponement of the elections from 31 July 2013 to a latter date.

The main reason why the MDC was seeking an extension was to allow Zimbabweans to be allowed more time to register as voters as well as to make sure that reforms which would have a bearing on the freeness and fairness of the election were done.

The MDC is committed to free and fair elections and does not agree with the Constitutional Court decision the effect of which was to subordinate key constitutional provisions to a date instead of subordinating the date to key constitutional provisions. The MDC leadership will study the reasons of the judgement when they are made available before making a decision about same

Statement from Honourable Douglas Mwonzora, MDC party spokesman, on the postponement today of the Southern African Development Community (SADC) special summit:

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“Although postponed, the MDC looks forward to the SADC special summit, which was scheduled for this weekend.

The key item we maintain after the Constitutional Court’s judgment on 31 May 2013 is that the date of the election is not as important as the integrity of the new constitution and the rule of law that governs elections and the people of Zimbabwe. As such, we recognize the urgent need for this special summit.

The MDC remains ready for free and fair elections.”

The reforms already agreed to by all parties of the Global Political Agreement (GPA) but not yet implemented must be put in place before elections occur include:

The key pieces of legislation that govern the freeness and fairness of elections have to be amended to reflect the reforms embodied in the new constitution, including: the Electoral Act, the Public Order and Security Act, the Access to Information and Protection of Privacy Act, the Citizenship Act, and the National Security Council Act. The parliament has to bring about these amendments before the elections can be scheduled.

It is critical that ALL Zimbabweans who are eligible to vote under the new constitution be given equal opportunity to register as voters. The new constitution provides for a mandatory voter registration exercise for a period of at least 30 days. That voter registration exercise should be followed by a period of inspection of the voters roll. The money for this exercise has already been secured and therefore the exercise must commence immediately. The ZEC must also ensure that voter registration is administered fairly among all constituencies and without regard to the political affiliation and with respect to the particular logistical challenges faced by rural citizens. Until these voter registration problems are sorted out it will be unfair to proceed with an election in which some citizens are excluded from participating.

Media reforms should be implemented that would require publicly funded outlets, including the Zimbabwe Broadcasting Corporation (ZBC) to cover events by all political players in an impartial and objective manner. In addition, public media houses would be expected to desist from hate speech, and malicious and partisan reporting. The government would also be required to register and license independent and private radio and television broadcasters before elections to provide Zimbabweans with alternatives to state-controlled media. It is critical to note that the political parties through the negotiations brokered by SADC agreed to embark on these media reforms to ensure a more even playing field in the elections.

Security reforms must implement a code of conduct for Zimbabwe’s security forces during elections that provides a professional, impartial and non-partisan security sector. This sector must desist from overtly making partisan political statements and abusing state resources to impose partisan interests and agendas. These security forces are a national asset belonging to the people of Zimbabwe for peace and tranquility and not the opposite. It is critical that these provisions are implemented before elections can be held.

The specter of violence has bedeviled all Zimbabwean elections since 1980. With this in mind the new constitution makes it clear that Zimbabweans have a right to elections free from violence and intimidation. Therefore mechanisms to ensure the eradication of all forms of violence especially state-sponsored violence must be put in place before the election.

As the MDC, the people’s party of excellence, we want to state and restate that Zimbabwe cannot hold credible elections without the implementation of the aforementioned minimum reforms. The MDC urges all previously disenfranchised voters to take this opportunity to regularize your identity documents in order to restore your citizenship and voting rights. If you previously lost your ID or birth certificate, you can also have them replaced for free during this time.

The MDC asks everyone to spread the word among family, friends, and colleagues who might not be aware of this long overdue legislation. If you have any difficulty at the Registrar General's office, please consult your local MP or Ward Councilor, who are standing by to support you.

Zimbabweans of foreign origin have not voted since the 2000 constitutional referendum. The MDC encourages anyone with alien identity cards and who qualify as voters to not delay having these swapped for citizen IDs. Your right to vote has for too long been denied.

Statement from The Honourable Tendai Biti, MDC Secretary General, on conditions in advance of the 31 July Elections:

In light of the SADC Maputo resolutions, which directed that Zimbabwe implements key reforms especially on media, security sector and legislative before elections, Zanu PF has blatantly disregarded the SADC call.

One of the key reforms as resolved by the regional body was media reforms particularly emphasising on the need to re-establish the Zimbabwe Mass Media Trust (ZMMT) and the appointment of a new Zimbabwe Broadcasting Holdings (ZBH) board. It is public knowledge now that this has not been implemented in clear defiance of SADC.

On security sector reforms, SADC directed that security chiefs to issue out a statement stating that they will not make political statements and take an obligation to sign a code of conduct in terms of Section 208 of the new Constitution. That statement has not been made and there has not been any political indication that this will happen before the elections.

It must be noted that 50 percent of the candidates in the Zanu PF primary elections were serving members of the country's security establishment with a third of them now set to represent the party during the coming elections.

SADC resolved that we should have during the last Parliament realigned some of our laws in the new Constitution with parliamentary laws.

Among these is the new Provincial Government Act, which is not covered in both the Urban and Rural Council Acts. There was need to repeal other laws such as the Public Order and Security Act (Posa), Access to Information and Public Protection Act (AIPPA), the draconian Section 121

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of the Criminal Procedure and Evidence Act.

Further, Mugabe used a decree to enact the Electoral Act when we still had enough time to get it through Parliament and SADC urged us to do the same and before the expiry of the last Parliament when we still had two weeks within which to have done this and once again our friends in Zanu PF disregarded this.

Therefore, it is clear that without reviewing these laws, Zimbabwe is actually being forced to go into an illegal election.

SADC directed that the government should file an application at the Constitutional Court seeking an extension of the election but no such application was made by the Minister of Justice, Patrick Chinamasa as his application was defective.

It is clear therefore that Zanu PF has brought the chaos within its ranks into the government system and now seeks to railroad Zimbabweans into another sham election. They have ignored international laws and dictates hence it is now incumbent upon SADC to review whether Zimbabwe can hold credible, free and fair elections.

Voters' roll

The intensive mobile voter registration exercise has become a major theatre of shenanigans. In 2008, Zanu PF used violence and it has gone a step further and has now resorted to the use of keyboards and computers to rig the coming elections.

Thousands of Zimbabweans were disenfranchised during the voter registration exercise as they were not informed of where the centres were while officials at the centres were on a go slow and countless of prospective voters failed to register.

In Harare alone over 300 000 people failed to register. In areas, which are falsely perceived to be Zanu PF strongholds, high numbers of people registering were recorded. In Harare only 27 000 voters were registered while 57 000 were registered in Mashonaland West and 60 000 in Mashonaland East. Harare province had only five teams to conduct voter registration while Mashonaland East had 18.

One striking and mysterious scenario has been that some constituencies in Harare have actually recorded decreases in the number of persons on the voters' roll. Dzivarasekwa is an example. In 2008 there were 38 000 voters and that number has decreased to 22 000.

Last week, in a meeting with Prime Minister Morgan Tsvangirai, the Registrar General of Voters, Tobaiwa Mudede asked for a further US\$1 million to redo Harare, funds which were

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disbursed by the Treasury but nothing was done. It is therefore a logical thing to extend voter registration to next week Friday and I hope wisdom will prevail.

The numbers of people who have never registered to vote and are finding themselves on the voters' roll are increasing. Others in a particular ward have been transferred without their permission to another ward.

At the epicentre of this is a notorious Israeli company called Nikuv, which operates a drip irrigation company, called Third Stock and we are taking steps to establish its legal status and how they came to be working with the RGV. I can safely say there were not awarded a tender by the State Procurement Board and the RGV is only a department under the Ministry of Home Affairs that cannot award tenders.

Special voting

ZEC is going through the process of special voting. However, figures show that 69 000 police officers applied for special voting when the country only has about 40 000 police officers.

As Treasury, I can tell you we are not paying 69 000 police officers, it is almost double those on the country's payroll which is something questionable. The special voting vetting exercise is taking place at the Harare International Conference Centre and the place is heavily militarised with the police and the army doing the processing.

It is unacceptable and it is something that we have brought to the attention of ZEC.

Postal voting

There are 120 000 people registered for postal voting and these are Zimbabweans stationed outside the country. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs does not have a staggering 120 000 diplomats stationed at its foreign missions.

In the 2008 elections there were only 5 000 applications for postal voting.

Violations

Violations and violence are on the increase in our country since the MDC's loud red that was seen in Marondera on Sunday. The chaos faction in Zanu PF is trying to reignite and remobilise the arsenal of violence and we can see a deliberate attempt to decimate the MDC leadership.

They want to freeze Solomon Madzore and lock him up for the umpteenth time as they try to cripple the MDC Youth Assembly because of their ability to organise. The incidences are endless.

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However, notwithstanding all these shenanigans, the MDC has hit the road running. Our MPs and councillors are campaigning while President Tsvangirai is holding provincial rallies daily.

We have no doubt in our minds that the people of Zimbabwe are ready for real change and on 31 July there will be that change.

Begin Text:

Charter House, Harare, 13th June 2013

Today, early in the morning, I received a letter from President Mugabe dated 13 June 2013, in which he advised that in purported compliance with the Constitutional Court judgment, he was proclaiming the 28th of June 2013 as the sitting of the nomination court and the 31ST July as the Election Day.

As the Rt Hon. Prime Minister of this country and a key member of the coalition government, mere courtesy would have required prior discussions on this matter. However, this is a matter governed by the law.

In terms of the GPA we signed on 15 September 2008, which has been codified as the 8th schedule of the current Constitution of Zimbabwe, the President can only act in consultation with the Prime Minister in respect to any executive decisions including the announcement of the date of the election. Thus, President Mugabe's actions are a unilateral and flagrant breach of our Constitution and the GPA.

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I, as PM, cannot and will not accept this. Moreover, part 3 of the 6th schedule of our Constitution makes it clear that there shall be an intense 30-day voter registration exercise. Only on Tuesday in Cabinet all political parties agreed that this process had commenced on 10 June 2013 and would be completed on 9 July 2013.

The net effect of the proclamation is therefore to infringe on the Constitutional provisions obliging the 30-day intense voter registration exercise.

It will also mean that President Mugabe is disenfranchising many people who were registering to vote, for instance aliens and first time voters.

President Mugabe is also denying political parties and Zimbabweans the opportunity to inspect the voters roll.

In any event, section 26 A of our Electoral Act Cap 2:13 makes it clear that voter registration for everyone closes 24 hrs before the sitting of the Nomination Court. This means that voter registration will now close on the 27th of June 2013 instead of the 9th of July 2013. A clear, flagrant and fraudulent breach of our Constitution.

The new Constitution also makes it clear in section 8 of the sixth schedule that the forthcoming election must be conducted in “terms of the electoral law in conformity with this Constitution.”

That new Electoral law according to section 157 ought to provide among other things for new issues such as proportional representation for the election of Senators and the new two disabled Senators and members of the newly introduced provincial councils. As has been widely reported Cabinet only agreed to the proposed electoral law on Tuesday.

President Mugabe in calling for an election when the Electoral law has not been passed in Parliament is clearly acting unconstitutionally.

He is fully aware of this, hence the claim in his letter that he is using powers under the Presidential Powers (Temporary Measures) Act. Ladies and gentlemen, the Presidential Powers act, which in the past allowed the President to make laws on his own without Parliament is patently not in compliance with the new Constitution. For the avoidance of doubt, section 134 A of the new Constitution makes it clear that only Parliament has the power to make primary legislation and that its powers of making law cannot be delegated to anyone, including the President.

In any event, what is the material urgency when Parliament is still sitting until 29th of June 2013? Once it is accepted, as Cabinet accepted on Tuesday, that the intensive voter registration made obligatory by our Constitution began on 10 June to finish on 9 July, then the earliest date that the proclamation would have been on the 10th of July 2013. Our law makes it clear that the nomination court can only sit between 14 and 21 days of the proclamation. This means that the earliest date that the nomination court would sit would have been the 24th of July 2013.

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Our Constitution as well provides for a minimum 30- day period of campaigning to a maximum of 42 days before the election date. This means that after the nomination court sitting of the 24th July 2013, the earliest that the election could be held is the 25th August 2013.

The point being made is that President Mugabe has acted unlawfully and unconstitutionally and is deliberately creating and precipitating an unnecessary Constitutional crisis. The Constitution makes the President the chief upholder and defender of the Constitution. It is therefore regrettable that the chief defender and upholder has become the chief attacker and abuser of the Constitution.

Surely, the defender-in-chief cannot become the attacker-in-chief!

Elections in Zimbabwe have never been about the date but the process and conditions under which it is held. The people of Zimbabwe have always insisted on the date of elections being determined by the processes that have to be carried out to ensure a legitimate, credible and sustainable election.

This call has also been reiterated in numerous resolutions of SADC since the Dar es Salaam summit 29 March 2007. Only as recent as 1 June 2012, SADC at its summit in Luanda, resolved that Zimbabwe was obliged to attend to reforms for a year to the 30th of June 2013. Once those reforms were complete, the President and the Prime Minister would agree on a date for elections. You will also be aware that the three political parties signatory to the GPA have been involved in intense processes and negotiation under the facilitation of President Zuma. In these discussions, many issues have been agreed to although not implemented.

Agreement was reached on a ROADMAP and on 24 post-Maputo issues. All documents and agreements were handed over to President Zuma in June 2010.

Ladies and gentlemen, there are fundamental reforms to be carried out, which are currently the subject of negotiations between the parties now. These include:

- Media reforms
- Security sector realignment
- Alignment of our laws to the new Constitution
- Electoral reform including the issue of the voters roll On the voters roll alone, as late as Thursday 6th June 2013, the party negotiators agreed and restated that the voters roll process would be as follows:

- (1) A 30-day period of voter registration (10 June- 9July) followed by:
- (2) The voters roll preparation period (to be defined by ZEC) followed by:
- (3) The voters roll inspection period (to be defined by ZEC) followed by:
- (4) The final voters roll preparation (period to be defined by ZEC) followed by:
- (5) The signing off of an agreed voters roll by the political parties.

Clearly therefore, the unilateral proclamation made today is a deliberate attempt to stall the

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reform agenda in Zimbabwe. Without reforms, Zimbabwe is yet again heading to another contested, predatory and illegitimate election. In short, another June 27. As Morgan Tsvangirai, the Prime Minister of Zimbabwe and the President of the MDC, I will not accept a situation where Zimbabweans will yet again be railroaded and frog-marched to another illegitimate and violent election.

The people of Zimbabwe are suffering. Businesses are shutting down, workers are under attack and the economy has frozen. A fraudulent and illegitimate election will deepen the crisis and will not reverse this malaise.

Ladies and gentlemen, all of you are aware that SADC and the AU are the guarantors and curators of the Zimbabwean crisis. For six years they have selflessly and with great dedication and commitment, they have chaperoned and shepherded the Zimbabwean crisis. The GPA and the modicum of stability WE HAVE ENJOYED for the past five years are due to the tireless efforts of our African brothers and sisters, including President Zuma and his facilitation team.

The net effect of President Mugabe's unilateral and illegal proclamation is an unmitigated frontal and rear attack on SADC, the AU and President Zuma and his team. President Mugabe and his team cannot hide behind the concept of sovereignty that they long ago surrendered and mortgaged through the mis- governance and State failure that led SADC to engage in our affairs as way back as 2007.

They can also not hide behind a Constitutional Court judgement which all Zimbabweans agree is clearly practically and legally unenforceable.

It is also disturbing to note that it was President Mugabe himself who caused SADC to postpone the summit that was supposed to be held on Sunday the 9th of June 2013. It is now clear that President Mugabe called for the postponement in order to go to SADC with a done deal of an election date.

Thus clearly, President Mugabe has sought to render the forthcoming SADC summit a dead rubber and a talk show. This is clearly dishonest and disrespectful of the esteemed leaders of SADC, the AU, President Zuma and our brothers and sisters on the African continent.

I have clearly reflected on the matter and this morning, to defend the Constitution, I instructed my attorneys to file an urgent court application. In addition, I will be leaving tomorrow for SADC and will fully brief the regional leaders on the crisis in Zimbabwe.

Finally, I appeal to fellow Zimbabwean to remain calm but vigilant in the face of this provocation and illegality. History has taught us that evil never triumphs and the way of truth will always triumph.

As Morgan Tsvangirai, I call upon Zimbabweans to walk with me and stand by me in this patriotic fight to defend the truth and the Constitution.

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After all is said and done, I am certain that one day and very soon, Zimbabweans will have a government of their choice where they are free to pursue happiness and their dreams and aspirations.

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prepared to enhance relations with Zimbabwe if that country holds free and fair elections. Unfortunately, Mugabe seems to be up to his old tricks—voter suppression, intimidation, and violence as well manipulation of the constitution and electoral laws. Since free and fair elections are a prerequisite for the U.S. to consider normalizing relations with Zimbabwe, including reviewing sanctions on high ranking members of the Mugabe regime, are there any specific guidelines you can give to the Zimbabwe Government to assure its upcoming elections are conducted freely and fairly?

- Lack of control or regulations on natural resources, such as uranium mining or illicit diamond trading in Zimbabwe has a serious impact on all of Southern Africa from economic, social, and security perspectives. What is the U.S. prepared to do to help stop—or at least mitigate—this dangerous situation?

MDC CALLS FOR NO ELECTIONS WITHOUT REFORMS

Movement for Democratic Change Leader outlines electoral, media and security reforms that

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must take place to ensure free, fair and safe elections

(HARARE 26-April-2013) Yesterday, the Movement for Democratic Change (MDC) and party president, Dr. Morgan Tsvangirai, called for key electoral, media and security reforms to be implemented prior to the upcoming presidential elections in Zimbabwe.

“We have outlined and stated the key minimum conditions for the holding of a credible, free and fair election which would be expected in any other democracy,” said Morgan Tsvangirai, Prime Minister and Movement for Democratic Change candidate for President in 2013.

“It is clear that there are many issues that need to be addressed if we are to have a vote that is free, fair and credible.”

Top among MDC concerns are media and security reforms.

o **Media reforms** should be implemented that would require publicly funded outlets, including the Zimbabwe Broadcasting Corporation (ZBC) to cover events by all political players in an impartial and objective manner. In addition, public media houses would be expected to desist from hate speech, and malicious and partisan reporting. The government would also be required to register and license independent and private radio and television broadcasters before elections to provide Zimbabweans with truly alternative platforms of communications.

o **Security reforms** must implement a code of conduct for Zimbabwe’s security forces during elections that provides a professional, impartial and non-partisan security sector. This sector must desist from overtly making partisan political statements and abusing state resources to impose partisan interests and agendas. These security forces are a national asset belonging to the people of Zimbabwe for peace and tranquility and not the opposite.

The MDC plan also calls for reforms in the following areas to help ensure that the voice of the people of Zimbabwe is heard through free elections recognized by the world community:

- Guaranteeing the security of the vote, the security of the voter and the security of the outcome of the vote.
- Undertaking a ward-based, nationwide voter education, registration and inspection by the Zimbabwe Electoral Commission (ZEC).
- Addressing—in light of the 2008 electoral experience—the issue of the ZEC secretariat’s ability to ensure impartiality, credibility and the legitimacy of the outcome.
- Providing for the inclusive invitation and accreditation of election observers.
- Providing for the inclusive selection and deployment of polling officers and stations that represent all political parties.

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- Instituting electoral amendments and reforms that ensure that the laws governing elections are in line with the new Constitution and the expectations of the people—repressive laws such as POSA and AIPPA have no role to play in a free and fair Zimbabwe election.

The MDC is calling for these reforms in the wake of the 2008 election where widespread irregularities and vote rigging were apparent. The massive irregularities led to the current Global Political Agreement (GPA), a limited power-sharing arrangement between President Robert Mugabe's ZANU-PF party and the MDC.

The MDC recognises that again in 2013 the ZEC must be responsible for everything to do with elections, but notes recent and numerous disturbing reports of possible voter roll inconsistencies and widespread voter intimidation.

“As the MDC, the people's party of excellence, we want to state and restate that there shall be no credible election without the implementation of the aforementioned minimum reforms,” said Morgan Tsvangirai.

Dr. Tsvangirai also announced that he will be visiting leading decision makers within SADC and the AU to ensure that the people of Zimbabwe are guaranteed a free and fair election that will usher in a peace among parties and peace in all political processes including the national elections.

Remarks by President Morgan Tsvangirai to members of the press gathered at Harvest House on conditions in advance of the 31 July Harmonized Elections:

We are now five days away from the most important election in Zimbabwe since 1980 and we thought we could interact with members of the Fourth Estate to share with you and through you—with the people of Zimbabwe—our position regarding the electoral environment and the impending election. This is a watershed election; a defining moment at which the people of Zimbabwe will make a choice between a progressive future under an MDC Government or a return to the dark days of 2008 under an exhausted Zanu PF regime.

This is the first election coming after the highly disputed and violent poll of 2008, which led to a contested outcome and eventually, the formation of the Inclusive Government after SADC-led mediation. One of our collective commitments upon signing the Global Political Agreement (GPA) was to create conditions that would promote a lasting solution to the country's challenges.

The formation of the Inclusive Government was meant to soft-land the Zimbabwe crisis and prepare the ground for a truly free, fair and legitimate election, which—ideally—would not breed another contested outcome.

Our signatures to the GPA notwithstanding, we have observed with great disappointment that our partners in the Inclusive Government have not been sincere or willing to take a collective, consensus-based approach to enable a lasting solution to our political challenges. Instead, they have pursued unilateralism, arrogance and literally railroaded the nation into an election with all the ingredients for chaos, contestation and controversy.

As I have said before, it is with a heavy heart that we participate in this election because the reforms we have agreed under the auspices of SADC have not been implemented while the regional body's resolutions meant to create an environment for a credible election have been completely ignored.

Nevertheless, we are contesting this election because we believe in the people of Zimbabwe and we respect their collective desire for change in the way this country is managed by its political leaders. The tidal wave of change is self-evident across the whole country. We believe the people of Zimbabwe will come out in their multitudes to overwhelm a system that is otherwise contrived against transformation. We believe ultimately the people of Zimbabwe will protect and defend their vote.

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The electoral environment and election preparedness

While we acknowledge that compared to the orgy of violence that characterised the 2008 Run-off election campaign, there is an absence of overt violence. However, we are concerned at the high level of intimidation, especially in the rural areas. Reports that we have received indicate that traditional leaders in areas such as Gutu South are spreading falsified information designed to hoodwink and intimidate voters.

We also understand that police are not taking action to deal with perpetrators of violence and intimidation on the basis of instructions allegedly received from their superiors. This is unlawful. We encourage police officers to undertake their duties diligently.

The political stability that Zimbabweans presently enjoy is one of the key achievements of the Inclusive Government, which we formed. We wanted to ensure a progressive end of the culture of violence and impunity and we are pleased to see that with our influence there has been some political stability in recent years. In the past, when we have gone to elections with ZANU PF in sole charge of the country, violence has been the order of the day. Clearly, we in the MDC have made the crucial difference and we want Zimbabweans to continue to enjoy that political stability under our stewardship post-July 31.

Nevertheless, let us be clear and note that the absence of violence is not by itself the sole or supreme indicator of a free and fair electoral environment that will lead to a credible and legitimate election outcome.

In fact, there are many other issues that affect the legitimacy of the election. In the past, violence has been the dominant factor but it is by no means the only one factor that determines whether an election is free and fair. I would like all stakeholders, including the media and election observers to be aware of, and vigilant to the many other factors that I highlight in this statement, which pose a grave risk to the legitimacy of the forthcoming election.

Firstly, as we have all observed, the very limited time between the declaration of the election and the polling day has caused chaos in ZEC's election preparations, affecting the credibility of the process. The guarantors of the GPA, SADC had said the election date should be pushed back to allow for proper preparations for the elections, including the implementation of agreed issues which affect the environment ahead of the election. This did not happen, leading to, by ZEC's own admission, the chaotic situation in the conduct of the Special Vote on July 14th and 15th.

We are seriously concerned by the manner in which the National Logistics Committee is conducting its operations. In the first place there is severe lack of transparency by the committee, which actually runs the election machinery. We understand that this committee has been militarised. For example, civil service drivers have been replaced by personnel from the military.

There is also an attempt to disable the Joint Monitoring and Implementation Committee (JOMIC) in its election monitoring duties. All the three co-chairpersons of JOMIC have signed up to ensure that there is a JOMIC representative at every polling station. This is a matter, which only required the approval of ZEC. However, we have been advised that the matter has been

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referred to the Ministry of Justice, which is not in charge of the accreditation of observers. We urge ZEC to take its responsibility seriously and ensure that JOMIC observers are accredited.

Despite the SADC position on media and security sector re-alignment, we are approaching this election with no movement whatsoever in implementing the resolutions.

The public media are supposed to be impartial and objective but continue to tow the Zanu PF line and to exhibit gross partiality and unfairness in their news coverage in violation of the new Constitution.

Presently, we understand that the Zimbabwe Broadcasting Corporation (ZBC) is refusing to flight two of our adverts and no reason has been proffered. We are concerned that Zanu PF is being given an opportunity to review our adverts and that it appears the ZBC is not in control. Moreover, I have received information that foreign journalists, especially from the region, have not been accredited to cover our election. What are we hiding from the glare of the world and the region if we are going to be holding a credible election? By refusing media coverage we are only sowing seeds of doubt over the credibility of this election in the eyes of the world.

All SADC asked of the security forces is adherence to the new Constitution requiring service chiefs issue a public statement in fulfillment of Section 208 stating that they will uphold the Constitution and the will of the people. That public statement has not been made and we even have disturbing cases where some officials in the security forces are standing for election as Zanu PF candidates e.g. Oliver Mandidapaka in Buhera West. One has to appreciate the importance of that public statement as it would cleanse the environment of previous politically partisan statements that have been made by heads of security services and damaged the credibility of the elections.

I have traversed the country during our campaign and I have seen cases of intimidation particularly in the Mashonaland provinces. In Mvurwi, the venue for our rally was occupied by Zanu PF youths who purportedly were playing a football match, notwithstanding that we had booked the venue for our rally. In other areas, we found Zanu PF supporters distributing their party regalia at our venues. In Mudzi, Zanu PF supporters distributing party regalia were taking down the names of the recipients. We have told the people of Zimbabwe who are forcibly given the Zanu PF regalia to just take it so that we maintain peace and their security. We have said to our supporters, it is very cold this winter, please take the yellow and green T-shirts when offered and wear them for protection both from the cold and threat to your security but remember that on polling day it is not the regalia but your heart that votes. We believe that when polling day comes, with the privacy of their vote guaranteed, they will be able to vote freely for candidates of their choice, their forced regalia notwithstanding.

We also note with concern that the voter registration exercise was not satisfactory given that a lot of people were not able to register and were left disenfranchised. Remember that disenfranchising people is one of the oldest and most crude forms of election manipulation; the principle is that if they won't vote for you, don't let them vote and this is what we have seen over the voter registration exercise. The exercise closed with a lot of people still in the queues. We pleaded with ZEC to allow people more time to register but ZEC ignored our plea. We cited

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Section 155 of the new Constitution to say that ZEC is obliged to ensure that everyone who is eligible to register must be given an opportunity to register. ZEC rejected our plea on behalf of the people of Zimbabwe.

Then there was the chaos during the special voting exercise. Our question is: If 89,000 people failed to vote in two days, can ZEC deliver a credible election of 6.2 million voters in one day? We hear ZEC has applied to the court to allow those who could not vote on the special voting days to do so on 31st July. As a party we believe everyone should be allowed to vote but we ask why ZEC displays double standards when it rejected our plea to allow Zimbabweans to register so that they could vote, something that is also required of them under the new Constitution? As an election supervisory body, we expect ZEC to apply similar rules and principles to all people, not to engage in selective application of the Constitution.

Voters' roll

The voters' roll is the critical battleground that defines the credibility and legitimacy of this election. The Electoral Act requires ZEC to make freely available the voters' roll to all contesting candidates and political parties. The Sixth Schedule, Part 3 Section 6(3) of the Constitution provides that ZEC must conduct a voters' roll inspection exercise. The intensive voter registration period ended on 9 July 2013. It is now 17 days later, and only five days before the elections, yet ZEC has failed to produce a voters' roll despite our written requests.

Much of our concern stems from the fact that the production of a final voters' roll, audited by the political parties before the proclamation of the election date, was one of our issues for inclusion on the Election Roadmap. A clean voters' roll means that vote manipulation and vote rigging are minimized.

Before we go to an election, we need to be satisfied that the voters' roll is credible and that problems that have been raised in the past have been resolved to pave the way for a free and fair election. It is ZEC's duty that the Registrar General's (RG) office produces the roll within sufficient time for the political parties to review it, and in fact ZEC must have provided the necessary quality assurances that the roll is indeed clean. We are now six days before an election and the roll has not been furnished to us to see for ourselves that all is in order.

We still have not received any assurance that there is a credible voters roll that will be used on polling day—a roll that has been signed off on by all the political parties contesting in the elections. In short, with five days to go to the election, this country does not have a credible and transparent voters' roll.

The lack of a transparent voters roll is the biggest issue impacting negatively on the credibility and legitimacy of this election. Why ZEC and the RG's office cannot be open and transparent about this critical document is a serious cause for concern. The RG's office even had the audacity to go to court to interdict and stop a local civil society organization, which wanted to expose the irregularities in the voters' roll. What is there to hide in a public document that should be open to public scrutiny?

Ballot papers

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Section 52A of the Electoral Amendment Act places a legal obligation on ZEC to “without delay” provide details of where and by whom the ballot papers are being printed. We have received reports that ballots are being printed at Police Headquarters, which would be flouting the laws regarding tender procedures. ZEC itself has refused or ignored our requests to give us this information, which we say is a direct violation of the Constitution. This information was not provided before the special vote and even when we went to court, ZEC opposed our application requiring compliance with the law. In this last week before the election, it should be open knowledge who is printing the ballots and where. We are not demanding this information because we want to be troublesome but because this is what the law requires of electoral authorities. We are concerned that vagueness in ballot paper printing, the voters’ roll, the handling of the postal vote provides cover for electoral manipulation, otherwise referred to as rigging. All we demand is transparency in compliance with the law and all doubts will be removed.

Further, we are concerned that the ballots are still being printed, giving rise to fears that the chaos of ballots arriving late or not all seen with the special vote, is going to be repeated on the 31 July election day, when ZEC will only have one day and will not be able to cope with the demands.

But perhaps the most glaring case is where ballots cast during the special vote were discovered in a bin. These are ballots that had been cast in my favour but were discovered discarded in a bin. The question is how many such ballots were thrown away and what replaced them? This is yet another crude form of vote manipulation. The evidence is there. This goes to the core, not only of the credibility of the special vote, but of ZEC and the forthcoming election as well.

Decrease in polling stations in Harare

ZEC has announced that there will be 9,670 polling stations countrywide, up from 9,113 in 2008. However, we are concerned that there seems to have been a decrease of polling stations in Harare, which is one of the largest provinces in Zimbabwe. The voting population of Harare has grown since 2008 and we expected at least 1,000 polling stations in the capital.

In May 2013, Zimbabwe Election Support Network (ZESN) estimated that ZEC should establish an additional 489 polling stations (227 in Harare) in order that all voters have a reasonable and equal opportunity to vote as enshrined in the Constitution. ZESN’s analysis shows that because of new voters who have turned 18 since the 2008 elections as well as already eligible voters who have changed residence, there are 232 wards with an insufficient number of polling stations. This did not cause a problem during the constitutional referendum because citizens were permitted to vote at any polling station in the country. However, it is likely to cause serious delays in processing voters on the 31st of July.

We have asked ZEC to explain why Harare province has only been allocated 830 stations, when it has over 1.2 million estimated voters (the highest in all of the provinces). Midlands has been given 1,341 polling stations with an estimated voting population of a little over 762,000 (ZESN research). We have not received an explanation or information from ZEC, which we believe to be necessary for us to participate effectively in the election in terms of the Constitution. We believe the low number of polling stations in Harare, which is traditionally an MDC stronghold,

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is designed to deliberately slow down the voting process, frustrate voters and eventually disenfranchise them.

Counting of votes at polling station not at ward

Part of the political parties negotiations of the Electoral law amendments included the provision that counting of votes be done at the polling station and not at the ward level. This was further fortified in the amendment law we agreed in Cabinet this year.

Our election agents are being advised by ZEC's constituency officers that counting will commence at the ward level. This is of concern to us because it is an important anti-rigging mechanism that results not only are counted, but are also known and are verifiable at each polling station. Without this important information at the polling station level, the election can be stolen. ZEC needs to orient its officers on the provisions of the law.

Conclusion

What we have seen on the ground so far is clear evidence that the credibility of this election is at serious risk. There is clear evidence of manipulation and a desperate attempt to subvert the people's will. We have engaged observer missions and given them our position on some of these issues.

However, unless ZEC takes steps up to address these concerns, and the guarantors intervene to press for a credible poll, we could be destined for a manipulated result, despite the clear position of the majority of Zimbabweans that they want change and real transformation. The tragedy is that when we agreed the GPA in 2008, the objective was to soft-land the crisis and create conditions that would lead to a lasting solution to the national challenge but the behaviour of our counterparts in recent weeks has shown an inclination towards a chaos scenario which would lead to inconclusiveness, controversy and contestation of the outcome.

But we have immense belief in the people of Zimbabwe. I have travelled to many corners of this country and I have seen for myself the palpable desire for change. I have spoken to the old and the young and they have all assured me that come July 31 they will be stepping up and voting for progress and MDC-T represents progress. We are humbled by this overwhelming show of support. I urge all Zimbabweans to join me on July 31 in the queue for change. They will try to delay things and frustrate us but let us go early; let us sleep overnight at the polling stations; let us remain in the queues until we cast our historic votes.

Reports of Poll Irregularities Already on Record

As polls open the reports are that Movement for Democratic Change (MDC) supporters have already queued up to be heard in this election.

The bumper crowd of 120,000 that constituted the Cross Over Rally in Harare Monday is clear testimony that Zanu PF and Mugabe are in for a hard fought battle at the ballot box. Already the state media has started to prepare the nation for a runoff election and have pinned their hopes on Welshman Cube to split the presidential vote and possibly force a runoff election.

The state machinery has now embarked on a number of measures calculated to interfere with the vote. These include the following:

A. Slowing the voting process in Harare

We have discovered that ZEC wants to slow down the voting process in urban centers particularly in Harare by reducing the number of voting points on each polling station. We are told that some of the polling officers will deliberately embark on a "go slow" just as they did during the voter registration exercise. This will definitely disenfranchise millions of voters.

Denying the MDC a copy of the analysable electronic Voters' Roll

The ZEC is yet to avail un updated electronic voters' roll despite concerted efforts by MDC to have this availed by the electoral body.

Our source has also revealed that ZEC has failed to locate about 1,000 ballots for Goromonzi West constituency. We call upon the International community especially SADC and the AU to be wary of these worrisome developments, which is certainly meant to effectively put the electoral process in the hands of the partisan Security Forces.

Joint Operations Command (JOC) interference

Although our constitution prohibits political interference by the security forces, our sources have revealed that ZEC has been instructed to send election results to JOC first before making them public.

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B. Limiting Media space

Zanu PF has embarked on serious cyber interference as a way of closing down communication platforms such as Whatsapp, Bulk text (SMS) messaging as a way to curtail flow of information as voting progresses. Another sinister intention is to hide this election process from the world. We are also aware that Jonathan Moyo is behind the prohibition of airing of the MDC adverts on ZBC. We will lodge our displeasure with the relevant bodies, the AU, COMESA and SADC.

C. Intimidation

Village heads

We are alive to the fact that village heads under instructions from Zanu PF have been implored to hold meetings with villagers today, to arrange how they will vote. The village heads have been instructed to que with their subjects at polling stations. This is unlawful and people must resist this. We will raise this concern with the observer team.

Jonathan Moyo's Malicious Utterances on state broadcaster

The MDC totally condemns utterances by Prof Moyo on ZTV, on 29/09/2013 in which he sought to intimidate the nation with statements like, "If you don't vote wisely, the baton will not be passed. President Mugabe has the final say in it all." This is not only malicious but totally unacceptable in modern dictates of politics. We object strongly to these utterances, coming on the eve of the election. Jonathan Moyo's posturing is not only primitive but downright archaic and undemocratic.

Jabulani Sibanda's threats

As if taking a cue from Professor Jonathan Moyo, the rabid war veteran Jabulan Sibanda again abused the state broadcaster on 30/07/2013 to issue threats to the electorate, by claiming that war veterans will not accept any one without national values. Again we condemn such tired misguided utterances from Jabulan. This is not only unacceptable but frivolous and we urge the people of Zimbabwe not to take such outbursts seriously. In Kariba Major Nuku and Sagent Major Ngwenya have been going around in the night wielding guns, specifically to intimidate the MDC councillors.

Arrests of MDC officials and activists

There has been a sudden surge in cases of arrests of MDC officials and activists by police lately. Our Chief presidential election agent Morgan Komichi, is still languishing in cells after being denied bail, hours before elections. In Chimanimani West District chairperson Freddy Dziwande was yesterday afternoon arrested for allegedly drawing people's attention by hooting his car on his way to a rally, which was addressed by Hon Lynette Karenyi. Dziwande was still held at Nedziwa Police Station by yesterday. Again in Manicaland, a supporter was arrested on Saturday for allegedly addressing a meeting that was not sanctioned by police. He is out on \$50 bail and is to appear in court soon.

ZEC bungling escalates

With some hours to go before this crucial election, we continue to unearth serious unprecedented irregularities in the administration of this election by the Zimbabwe Electoral Commission. We have it on good authority that in Bulawayo's Nketa and Nkulumane constituencies, ZEC deliberately misplaced polling stations to confuse voters.

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For instance, in Nketa Constituency there are three polling stations which are supposed to cater for Nkulumane voters. What this means is that Nkulumane voters will have to travel to Nketa to vote while those in Nketa will be turned away in their constituency and will start looking for their actual polling stations. As a result this fraud will disenfranchise the voter and cause confusion on the electorate.

Further to this, still in Bulawayo, there are revelations that there are more than 90,000 extra ballots that have been brought into the province. Also there are ballot papers that have been found without any serial numbers while other wards had shortage of ballot papers. It has also come to our attention that some ballot papers which arrived yesterday on Monday had the same serial numbers with the ones previously received.

**A RESPONSE TO TODAY'S SUPREME COURT RULING ON DATE OF
THEELECTION FROM THE OFFICE OF THE PRIME MINISTER OF
ZIMBABWE**

(HARARE 31-May-2013)

In response to today's earlier ruling by the Zimbabwe's Supreme Court calling for an election to take place by 31 July 2013, the Prime Minister of Zimbabwe, Dr. Morgan Tsvangirai's office released the following statement:

“Whilst I have great respect for the courts and the judiciary system, today's ruling by the Supreme Court setting an election date is evidence that the court has far overstepped its mandate.

The Supreme Court has no power whatsoever to set an election date. In the true spirit of independence and the separation of powers, an election date remains a political process in which the executive has a role to play.

There is clear evidence that there are some within the executive who wish to circumvent the consultative role in the GPA and the share responsibility enshrined therein to pronounce an election date under the cloak of judicial authority.

An election date is the responsibility of the executive, which has not shown that it has failed to

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announce such a date. SADC and the people of Zimbabwe know that an election date is a result of political pronouncements in which the judiciary has no role to play.

The Principals have a consultative mechanism that would ensure that a date is proclaimed following an agreement by all parties. This is what SADC, the AU and the people of Zimbabwe expect, not a date set up under the cover of the judiciary without a mechanism to ensure to that issues of the election environment and reforms are addressed.

Zimbabweans expect implementation of reforms and an intensive voter registration exercise that would not have anyone unnecessarily disenfranchised.

The only positive news from the ruling is that it has quashed the circus of an election date by June 29. This ruling only vindicates some of us that June 29 was a legal and political non-starter. It, however, still remains difficult to appreciate the practicality of an election by July 31.

The Constitution is clear that the term of Parliament expires on June 29 but section 63 (4) is clear that the executive can continue for a maximum of 4 months, which means an election has to be held by 30 October 2013.

One arm of government, in this case the Judiciary, cannot make a decision which should ordinarily lie in the other arm of the State: i.e the executive.”

About the Movement for Democratic Change (MDC)

A coalition of the many civic groups who campaigned for the "No" vote in the 2000 Constitutional Referendum, the Movement for Democratic Change (MDC) was founded to give voice to the struggle of the Zimbabwean people to rid themselves of the oppressive and corrupt ruling practices of President Robert Mugabe's ZANU PF.
