

About the Speaker

Dennis Halpin

Dennis Halpin has ties to Korea going back over four decades to February, 1971, when he arrived as a Peace Corps volunteer (K-16) in Seoul, South Korea. He taught English as a Second Language classes for two years at Kyunghee University and then, for a semester, at Seoul National University. Dennis returned to Korea a second time as a young Foreign Service Officer working at the American Embassy in Seoul from 1978 to 1982, first in the visa section and then in the political section. 1979 was a critical year for Korea, with the assassination of President Park Chung Hee. This was followed in 1980 by events which led up to the Kwangju Massacre.

Dennis returned to Korea for a third time, serving as the American Consul in Pusan from 1989 to 1993. In his position as American Consul, he was elected President of the Tongbaek International Rotary Club

of Pusan (1990-91). Before he left Korea at that time, Dennis served as official note taker for former President Clinton's first meeting with then ROK President Kim Young Sam at the Blue House in the summer of 1993.

Dennis served for three years at the American Embassy in Beijing (1995-98), first as a Deputy in the political section and then as nonimmigrant visa chief and then as acting Consul General in the consular section. He was also Embassy Coordinator for the UN Fourth World Conference on Women held in Beijing in the summer of 1995 and attended by First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton among other dignitaries. Dennis visited North Korea once during his tour in Beijing, when he attended a four-day UNDP-sponsored economic conference in Rajin/Sonbong in September 1996.

Dennis served on the Foreign Affairs Committee from the summer of 2000, first as a Pearson Fellow from the State Department (2000-2003) and subsequently as Professional Staff until January of this year. He then spent two months (February-March) as a Foreign Policy Advisor in the office of Representative Eni Faleomavaega of American Samoa, the Ranking Member on the Asia and the Pacific Subcommittee.

About the Speaker

Ambassador Thomas Graham Jr. is a former senior-level diplomat and a world-renowned authority on nuclear nonproliferation. As a U.S. diplomat, Ambassador Graham was involved in the negotiation of every major arms control and nonproliferation agreement from 1970 to 1997, including START, SALT, the CTBT, the INF Treaty, and the ABM Treaty, among many others. He participated in nuclear talks with more than 100 countries. For 15 years, Graham was general counsel for the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, where he also served as acting director for one year. He has advised five U.S. presidents on issues related to nuclear nonproliferation; as President Bill Clinton's special representative for arms control, nonproliferation, and disarmament, Graham headed the U.S. delegation that successfully led efforts to permanently extend the NPT.

In 2010 Graham was appointed to the United Arab Emirates' International Advisory Board, helping to guide that country's nuclear energy program and hold it to the highest standards of safety, security, and nonproliferation. He is a board director of CanAlaska Uranium Ltd., and has lectured at University of

Purpose

Convene a high-level annual/biannual private workshop among fifteen preeminent Korean, Japanese, and American nuclear energy policy experts with the intention of fostering relationships, confidence building, and seeking areas for trilateral cooperation on regional nuclear energy issues.

The principal focus of Meeting 2 is to build upon the themes and topics discussed during Meeting 1 in New Mexico, with a greater focus on the nuances of interim storage, advanced nuclear waste management technologies, safe and environmentally conscious operation of nuclear plants and facilities, and the nexus of waste management and nonproliferation. Through in-depth discussion of the aforementioned topics, further overlapping interests and opportunities for partnership can be revealed. Simultaneously, participants will observe the facilities at Savannah River National Laboratory, where extensive research on the relevant issues has taken place. Through allowing participants to engage in both formal discussions and applied research settings, it is hoped that greater opportunities for cooperation and collaboration will be forged among the respective nuclear policy communities in Japan, Korea, and the United States.

Savannah River Site (SRS)

The Savannah River Site (SRS) is a nuclear reservation in the United States in the state of South Carolina, located on the land in Aiken, Allendale and Barnwell Counties adjacent to the Savannah River. SRS was constructed during the early 1950s to produce the basic materials used in the fabrication of nuclear weapons, primarily tritium and plutonium-239, in support of our nation's defense programs. The Savannah River National Laboratory (SRNL) is the applied research and development laboratory at SRS, applying state-of-the-art science to provide high-value, cost effective solutions to complex technical problems. A major focus of activities at SRS revolves around the cleanup of activities related to work done in the past for America's nuclear buildup. SRS is currently is home to the United States' only tritium facilities, and the construction site to the only US MOX manufacturing plant, intended to convert legacy plutonium into fuel suitable for power reactors.
