



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### **Speaker Bio**

**Scott Snyder** is senior fellow for Korea studies and director of the program on U.S.-Korea policy at the Council on Foreign Relations (CFR), where he had served as an adjunct fellow from 2008 to 2011. Mr. Snyder's program examines South Korea's efforts to contribute on the international stage; its potential influence and contributions as a middle power in East Asia; and the peninsular, regional and global implications of North Korean instability. Mr. Snyder is also the co-editor of *North Korea in Transition: Politics, Economy, and Society* (Rowman and Littlefield, October 2012) and the editor of *Global Korea: South Korea's Contributions to International Security* (Council on Foreign Relations, October 2012) and *The U.S.-South Korea Alliance: Meeting New Security Challenges* (Lynne Rienner Publishers, March 2012). Prior to joining CFR, Mr. Snyder was a senior associate in the international relations program of The Asia Foundation, where he founded and directed the Center for U.S.-Korea Policy and served as The Asia Foundation's representative in Korea (2000-2004). He was also a senior associate at Pacific Forum CSIS.
