Amanda Sloat

Deputy Assistant Secretary

Amanda Sloat assumed her duties as Deputy Assistant Secretary in the Bureau of European and Eurasian Affairs in September 2013. In this capacity she is responsible for issues related to Greece, Turkey, and Cyprus, as well as for coordinating with Europeans on our engagement with

the countries of the Middle East and North Africa. Most recently, she served as Senior Advisor to the White House Coordinator for the Middle East, North Africa, and Gulf Region.

Dr. Sloat worked previously at the U.S. Department of State, serving as the Senior Advisor to the Assistant Secretary for European and Eurasian Affairs. Earlier, she was a member of the staff on the U.S. House of Representatives Foreign Affairs Committee, with responsibility for European policy. Her earlier work was as a senior program officer with the National Democratic Institute (NDI), including work in Iraq with the Council of Representatives.

Spencer P. Boyer is an Adjunct Assistant Professor at the *BMW Center for German and European Studies* at the *Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service* at Georgetown University. He is also the National Intelligence Officer for Europe in the National Intelligence Council (NIC), the center for long-range strategic thinking within the U.S. Intelligence Community. In this capacity, he serves as the senior European affairs analyst and principal subject matter expert on Europe for the Office of the Director of National Intelligence, and as a primary bridge between the intelligence and policy communities on European affairs.

Before joining the NIC in March 2014, Mr. Boyer was a Visiting Scholar and Senior Fellow at the Center for Transatlantic Relations at the *Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies* (SAIS) at Johns Hopkins University. During the first term of the Obama administration, he served as a Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for European and Eurasian Affairs, where his areas of responsibility included Western Europe, public diplomacy, and public affairs.

Bulent Aliriza has been the founding director of the Turkey Project at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS) in Washington, DC, since 1994. He has lectured widely in the United States, Europe, and Turkey and is a frequent media commentator on Turkish foreign policy and domestic politics. Prior to joining CSIS, Aliriza was a senior associate at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. He had previously served as a Turkish Cypriot diplomat in New York and Washington. He has a B.Sc. in international relations from the London School of Economics and Political Science and a doctorate in diplomatic history from the University of Oxford.
